COMMUNITY PARK

Our playground has been extremely popular and attracts a great deal of families daily. The new pickle ball court is available and residents can reserve court times. I hope everyone will take time to enjoy the trails, basketball, golf greens, dog park and/or ball fields at some point over the summer.

RECREATIONAL TRAILS

After many years of preparation and planning, we have finally put the recreational trail project out to bid. Assuming the bids are acceptable, we will be asking Council to authorize construction to commence later this summer. Hopefully, the entire project will be completed by the end of construction season, 2019. The plans call for six foot wide meandering trails on one side of all the main roads throughout the village. Upon completion, we will have a 7 mile network of trails connecting all of our neighborhoods to the Village Park and to Pinecrest. This will be a great recreational enhancement for our residents and a much needed improvement to safety on our roads.

Notification will be provided to all residents along the trail, updating them on the anticipated timeline once the contractor has been engaged. Additional updates will be posted during construction of the trails on our web site and in Village enews.

PINECREST

Our new "downtown" for Orange Village has opened with great fanfare and success. An exciting group of retailers and restaurants opened in June and many more will be opening over the next few months. There will be plenty of celebrations as these new businesses open, including live music and family friendly entertainment. The Orange Police Department is prepared. Are you?

Make a plan today. Your family may not be together if a disaster strikes, so it is important to know which types of disasters could affect your area. Know how you'll contact one another and reconnect if separated. Establish a family meeting place that's familiar and easy to find.

Recommended Items to Include in a Basic Emergency Supply Kit:

- Water: one gallon of water per person per day for at least three days, for drinking and sanitation
- Food: at least a three-day supply of non-perishable food
- Battery-powered or hand crank radio and a NOAA Weather Radio with tone alert and extra batteries for both
- Flashlight and extra batteries
- First Aid Kit
- Whistle to signal for help
- Dust Mask to help filter contaminated air and plastic sheeting and duct tape to shelter-in-place
- Moist towelettes, garbage bags and plastic ties for personal sanitation
- Wrench or pliers to turn off utilities
- Can opener for food (if kit contains canned food)
- Local maps
- Cell phone with chargers, inverter or solar charger

Additional Items to Consider Adding to an Emergency Supply Kit:

- Prescription medications and glasses
- Infant formula and diapers
- Pet food and extra water for your pet
- Cash or traveler's checks and change
- Important family documents such as copies of insurance policies, identification and bank account records in a waterproof, portable container. Emergency reference material such as a first aid book or information from www.ready.gov.
- Sleeping bag or warm blanket for each person. Consider additional bedding if you live in a cold-weather climate.
- Complete change of clothing including a long sleeved shirt, long pants and sturdy shoes.
- Household chlorine bleach and medicine dropper – When diluted nine parts water to one part bleach, bleach can be used as a disinfectant. Or in an emergency, you can use it to treat water by using 16 drops of regular household liquid bleach per gallon of water. Do not use scented, color safe or bleaches with added cleaners.
- Fire Extinguisher
- Matches in a waterproof container
- Feminine supplies and personal hygiene items
- Mess kits, paper cups, plates and plastic utensils, paper towels
- Paper and pencil
- Books, games, puzzles or other activities for children

2018 Road Program

Orange Village will complete the resurfacing of the Orange Tree Subdivision. Work will include removing the top 2" of asphalt, performing any necessary base repairs, repairing any damaged curbing and placing a new asphalt surface course.

The roadways will remain open and residents will have access to their driveways at all times.



We plan to bid the project out in mid-July and award in August. Our goal is to begin construction in early fall and end in October (weather dependent).

Additional work will include the milling and chip sealing of Orangedale Road.

Metal Recycling

A drop-off dumpster is available for ferrous and non-ferrous recyclables.

It is located at the Service Department, 4680 Lander Road, by the salt shed and is marked with a sign under the overhang. It is for "Metals only" - no other trash or products.

Recycling Opportunities

Branch Chipping

The Orange Village Service Department, will be collecting branches and brush on **July 23 and September 10**.

- ⚠ DO NOT mix leaves, grass clippings or yard material
- ⚠ Limbs should be placed with cut ends towards the road, no more than 2 feet high and 3 feet wide
- ⚠ DO NOT make large piles

This service is not intended to chip complete trees or for use by a commercial tree service provider.

Wood Chips

Orange Village delivers wood chips free of charge to residents. An approximate load size is 10 yards. Requests are honored in the order they are received, while supplies last. Place your order online at www.orangevillage.com or call Village Hall at 440-498-4400.

CONTAINER RENTAL SERVICE OFFERED

Orange Village will drop off an 8, 10 or 12 yard container through November (weather permitting) to help dispose of brush, yard waste, construction debris or household debris. You cannot mix items in the container but you can choose from several different types of materials to dispose. Costs vary depending on the items that will be disposed of. SAFETY STATION AT PINECREST

On June 7th the Orange Village Fire Department began staffing the new Safety Station located in the northern section of the new Pinecrest Development. Residents will remember that this Safety Station was one of the requirements of the comprehensive Pinecrest Development Agreement. Since it was included in the Development Agreement, the construction of this station was funded solely by the developer. This Safety Station includes space for both the Police and Fire Departments. For the Fire Department, this space includes a garage bay, day room, laundry room, kitchen, locker room and bathroom. The station will be staffed by two Firefighter/Paramedics who will work from 9am – 9pm. Additionally, there is room which will allow for the future expansion of sleeping quarters should this need arise.

An annual review of response statistics shows that a higher percentage of our calls are located in the northern section of the Village. By staffing this new station our response times for commercial occupancies at our northern border will be cut in half. In terms of Pinecrest, preparing for Fire and EMS related emergencies was a priority that required an immense amount of hard work and partnerships between Independence Construction, Fairmount Properties, Village Administration and the Police and Fire Departments. It was imperative that this effort not detract from the residents of our Village who have grown to depend on the outstanding level of service provided by



their safety forces. The end result was that coverage for our residents has improved and response times have been reduced for those living on Harvard and all addresses to the north. All residents will continue to experience response times well below the national average. We are excited to initiate this expansion and remain proud to serve the residents of this wonderful Village.



Placement of Your Refuse and Recycling Containers

Kimble Recycling & Disposal supplied refuse and/or a recycle container to all homes in Orange Village. All refuse/recycle containers are the property of Kimble/Orange Village and should remain with the home.

Per Ordinance No. 939.02 PLACEMENT AND REMOVAL OF GARBAGE AND RECYCLING CONTAINERS, No owner or occupant shall place any container of garbage or recyclable material out prior to 4:00 pm on the day before the scheduled trash collection day. You must remove any container used for garbage disposal or recyclable material from any municipal right of way before 10:00 am of the day after any trash collection day. Please place your containers at least 2 feet from the street with the lid opening facing the street and 3 feet from other objects. Please place recycling on one side of your driveway and trash on the other.



Petiquette

To all dog owners in Orange Village, please know that there is legislation regarding removal of feces and barking or howling animals:

NOTICE



LEASH AND CLEAN UP AFTER YOUR DOG



IT'S THE LAW

505.085 Removal of dog feces. No person being the owner or in charge or control of any dog, shall permit such dog to commit a nuisance on school grounds, Village grounds or other public property, or upon any private property other than the property of such owner or person without the permission of the owner of such property. The owner or person in charge or control of such dog shall immediately removes all feces deposited by such dog and dispose of the same in a sanitary manner.

505.09 Barking or howling dogs. No person shall keep or harbor any dog within the municipality which by frequent and habitual barking, howling or yelping creates loud and disturbing noises of such a character, intensity and duration as to disturb the peace, quiet and good order of the municipality.

505.01 Dogs or other animals running at large. No owner can allow a dog to run at large. All dogs must be on a leash when they are being walked.

Let's be very conscious of the law as responsible dog owners in order to enjoy our pets and provide a safe and healthy environment for everyone in Orange Village.

Keep Orange Village Beautiful!

Please help keep Orange Village green and beautiful!

-  Please maintain your lawn. Grass longer than eight (8) inches is a violation of Chapter 521.11 of the Codified Ordinances of Orange.
-  Clean up fallen seeds and hulls from around bird feeders to keep wild animals and rodents away.



-  Keep your gutters clean and free of debris to prevent water in your basement due to gutter overflow.
-  Cut dead limbs from shrubs around your house. Decaying wood attracts ants and insects.
-  All contractors must register with the building department. This is for the homeowner's protection.
