Emergency Notification- Test Call

General Notification - Test Call



Orange Village has contracted with Emergency Communications Network to license its CodeRED emergency notification service. The CodeRED system **replaces** our current Reverse 911 system. All information from the old system will be transferred. CodeRED imported information from an outside source as well. You may sign up for emergency (highly recommended) and/or general notification calls/texts. Emergency information would include boiling alerts for water, gas leaks and any other incidents where rapid and accurate notification is essential. General notifications will include reminders of paper shredding, Music at the Muni events, changes to trash schedules and other non-emergency items.

On **Thursday, April 18th**, Orange Village will conduct a test. The “emergency” notification will state that it is a “test” and no action needs to be taken. The “general” notification will be a reminder that Orange Village will be conducting a paper shredding event on Saturday, April 20th from 9:00 am to 12:00 pm. If you receive both calls you are signed up for both emergency and general notifications.

If you DO NOT receive the emergency test message and/or the notification concerning paper shredding on April 18, and would like to sign up for these important messages or add additional phone numbers or email address, please follow the steps below:

- ❖ Log onto our website, www.orangevillage.com
- ❖ Click on the CodeRED link
- ❖ Enter your address, city, state and zip code
- ❖ Enter your contact information and telephone numbers, please specify if they are mobile numbers. (you may only enter two numbers per address at one time, if you need to enter more phone numbers you may go back and reenter your address. You can have several phone numbers linked to one address.
- ❖ Alert types: Both types will be checked. If you DO NOT want to receive general notifications, you must uncheck the box.
- ❖ Create an account, this is optional but will be needed if you would like to add the CodeRED app to your smart phone. Please keep your user name and password in a safe location as we do not have the capability to access that information.
- ❖ Emergency notifications will be displayed on caller ID as 1-866-419-5000 or Emergency Comm
- ❖ General notifications will be displayed on caller ID as 1-855-969-4636 or ECN Community.

If you do not have access to a computer, please contact the Orange Village Police Department at 440-498-4401. You must provide *first and last name, street address (no P.O. Boxes), city, state, zip code, and phone number(s)*.

Please take the time to help us reach you in case of an emergency and to keep you informed.

Heritage Home Program Low Interest Loans and More



Orange Village is teaming up with the Heritage Home Program to bring owners of homes fifty years or older low interest loans for home repairs and maintenance, free technical advice and personalized site visits, and workshops. Qualified homeowners also have the option of obtaining a low-interest, fixed-rate Heritage Home Program loan, with rates as low as 1.5% for up to 10 years. Many interior and exterior projects are eligible that make your home more enjoyable, while preserving architectural character. Vinyl products cannot be funded.

Dear Neighbor,

Already 2013 is shaping up to be a very busy year filled with great activities and accomplishments for Orange Village. I'd like to update you on just a few of the highlights:

Construction of a new and efficient service department facility. Construction is progressing on schedule. The interior of the service department administrative building (a/k/a the former church building) is almost ready to be dry-walled. The interior spaces have been framed out and utilities are being installed. The great news is that there will be a large usable space with a banquet kitchen that will be dedicated for community functions and will be convenient for use as part of the future amphitheater project. The foundations for the new maintenance garage and salt storage structure have begun and we will see construction of these buildings as soon as the weather permits.

Participation in the Merger/Shared Services Study with Moreland Hills, Pepper Pike & Woodmere. There has been a lot of activity taking place on this important initiative. In early February there were public meetings held in each of the four communities. These meetings were well attended, informative and a lot of interesting feedback was received. Our professional consultants, from CGR Group, have been gathering data from the various departments and conducting study committee meetings to discuss options and opportunities. While the study recommendation will address the topic of 2, 3 or all 4 communities merging as a possible option, much of the focus has been on achieving greater efficiencies in service delivery, without compromising the quality of services our residents already receive. An item that became apparent during the merger study meeting process is a lack of awareness of the many existing collaborative efforts already taking place between Orange Village and many other communities in order to provide our residents with services in the most efficient manner. Many times, due to these collaborations, we obtain services which we could not afford to do on our own.

For example: Orange Village, along with 15 other communities, is a member of the **Valley Enforcement Regional Council of Governments**. Working together, we are able to provide our communities with a highly trained S.W.A.T. team, accident investigation units, hostage negotiation teams and other specialized law enforcement activities. Similarly, our Village is a member of the **Southeast Council of Governments HAZMAT** team which was formed in 1990 to assist local fire departments in responding to incidents involving hazardous materials and industrial chemicals. Another example of a shared services collaboration already in place is the **Regional Income Tax Agency (R.I.T.A.)** which is an association of over 200 municipalities combined under one agency to collect local income tax revenue for its members at a cost (last year the cost was less than 3% of collections) which we could not achieve individually or independently. These are just three examples of the more than 30 activities which Orange Village is already benefitting from by working collaboratively with others.

Working together and sharing resources with our neighboring communities helps us receive services in the most efficient and economical way without compromising quality. We look forward to learning other ways we can keep our communities strong and viable by working smarter and more efficiently.... collaboratively.

PineCrest Mixed Use Development proposal. Publicly unveiled at the March 19th Planning & Zoning meeting, this proposed development will be formally introduced at Council in the months ahead. Rezoning of the property will be subject to a vote of the residents. In its current version, the developer is proposing a mixed use project with retail (intended to be new and different retail opportunities to this part of the region), office and residential uses. There will be many opportunities for public input and discussion as this project proceeds through the formal review process.



Keep Recycling - Save the Planet and Orange Village

We understand that many residents are recycling, but in 2013 the overall recycling rates have decreased compared to the past two years. In 2012 we recycled 28% of the total waste stream generated in our community. This has resulted in real cost savings to our community. Over 445 tons were diverted from the landfill saving Orange Village nearly \$18,000 in 2012. Over 75% of waste is recyclable, but we only recycle less than 30%. Let's set a goal of recycling 500 tons this year! Together we can do it.

Orange Village provided 64 gallon Toters to each residence in order to assist with recycling efforts. All items can be placed in this container. Orange Village is committed to saving the environment, please assist us with this worthwhile endeavor. We offer recycling information via our website, recycle calendar, newsletters and e-news.

Below are several tips to assist you with this worthwhile goal:

- ☆ If you see your neighbor is not recycling, try to give them some encouragement to participate.
- ☆ Review the recycle calendar (mailed to every home) or our website www.orangevillage.com to see if there are materials that you are not recycling.
- ☆ Begin a yard compost program (see the Cuyahoga County Solid Waste District's website at cuyahogawd.org).
- ☆ Donate or find other uses (rags, packing, etc.) for old clothing.
- ☆ Give away or donate toys, bicycles, and other games to donation centers.

- ⚠ DO NOT mix leaves, grass clippings or yard material
- ⚠ Limbs should be placed with cut ends towards the road, no more than 2 feet high and 3 feet wide
- ⚠ DO NOT make large piles

This service is not intended to chip complete trees.

Grant Awarded to Assist with Recycling Efforts

University Hospital Ahuja Medical Center Donates Life Saving Lucas Device

On Monday March 4th, University Hospital Ahuja Medical Center President Susan Juris appeared before members of the Orange Village Fire Department in order to present the Firefighter/Paramedics with a new state of the art device directed at improving the survival rates of cardiac arrest victims. Orange Village is proud of the partnerships we have formed with University Hospitals and is grateful for this generous donation to the fire department and members of our community. The device, known as a Lucas Chest Compression System, is a safe and efficient tool that standardizes chest compressions during CPR in accordance with the latest scientific guidelines. It provides the same quality for all patients regardless of transport conditions, rescuer fatigue, or variability in the experience level of the caregiver. By doing this, it frees up rescuers to focus on other life-saving tasks and creates new rescue opportunities. In

fact, the very next morning on March 5th, members of the Orange Fire Department utilized the device on a full cardiac arrest patient. According to Lieutenant Eric Strauss "The device performed perfectly and allowed our Paramedics to work farther down in our protocols than we are accustomed to. By freeing up one Paramedic from performing chest compressions our members can more efficiently establish advanced airways, administer Advanced Cardiac Life Support (ACLS) medications and provide an increased level of patient care".

The device is relatively new to the area and is extremely efficient in its application. Paramedics attach the unit to the full cardiac arrest patient and perform quick adjustments for the patient's anatomy. After pressing a button the unit acts in a similar manner as a piston in an engine and yields concise and uniform chest compressions at a rate of 100 per minute. According to Lt. Strauss "Now more than ever before, researchers are calling for better quality CPR compressions with minimal or no interruptions. This device works as we move the patient down a staircase and into the rescue squad without ever stopping. In my opinion we will see an increase in overall survival rates once these devices become more common."

Mayor Kathy Mulcahy, Fire Chief Robert Wilson and all members of the fire department would like to thank University Hospitals for this incredible donation.

Orange Village Building Department strives to keep our community a beautiful place to live; however, to accomplish this, we need the support of our residents.

Below are some ways you can help:



-  Remember that all contractors working within the Village are required to be registered with the Building Department before any work is started.
-  As the snow melts, please clean any catch basins located on your property. They should be free from leaves and debris to obtain maximum drainage.
-  Keep your gutters clean and free of debris.
-  Clean up fallen seed and hulls that have fallen around bird feeders. This will help keep animals and rodents away.
-  You might see Tom Shields, Housing and Zoning Inspector, driving around this spring. He will be visually inspecting for maintenance violations of properties in Orange Village.
