

IT'S THE LAW

## **Petiquette**

To all dog owners in Orange Village please know that there is legislation regarding removal of feces and barking or howling animals.

**505.085 Removal of dog feces.** No person being the owner or in charge or control of any dog shall permit such dog to commit a nuisance on school grounds, village grounds or other public property or private property of such owner or person without the permission of the owner

of such property. Where the owner or person in charge or control of such dog immediately remove all feces deposited by such dog and dispose of the same in a sanitary fashion.

**505.09 Barking or howling dogs.** No person shall keep or harbor any dog within the municipality which by frequent and habitual barking, howling or yelping creates loud and disturbing noises of such a character, intensity and duration as to disturb the peace, quiet and good order of the municipality.

**505.14 Dangerous dogs.** Any dog with a known propensity, tendency or disposition to attack unprovoked, to cause injury or to otherwise endanger the safety of human beings or domesticated animals;

**505.01 Dogs or other animals running at large.** No owner can allow a dog to run at large. All dogs must be on a leash when walking a dog.

Let's be very conscious as responsible dog owners of the law in order to enjoy our pets and provide a safe and healthy environment for everyone in Orange Village.

#### **Pinecrest**

This summer finds us especially busy evaluating the planned lifestyle center development called Pinecrest, which has been proposed for the northwest corner of our Village. The Village Council, Planning & Zoning Commission and professionals are working overtime on the crafting of regulations and supportive documents for a proposed planned mixed use zoning district, a development agreement and preliminary development plans. Through these efforts, the Village representatives are focused on ensuring that the developer will deliver to our community only the highest quality upscale center, as has been presented and promised. Our goal is to make sure this development will be an asset to our lifestyle in Orange Village through the addition of new retailers to the region, desirable amenities for our residents and the expansion and diversification of our tax base, while protecting the values of our neighboring residential properties. Of course, the Village's voters will have the final approval whether this project will happen by weighing in at the ballot box to decide if this is acceptable to our Village. All council meetings are open to the public and special sessions will be scheduled to allow our residents to learn more and ask questions. #### Merger/Shared Services Study

Progress continues on the Merger/Shared Services Study with meetings and data collection by all the departments and work groups. The consultants are expected to begin rolling out the results of their research over the next few months in a series of reports and recommendations. We will immediately share this information and engage the public in reviewing and discussing their suggestions.

#### **Firehouse Subs**

Orange Village residents, Mark & Dana Matthews, have a long and special relationship with the Orange Village Fire

Department dating all the way back to the department's origin. They have recently opened up a franchise restaurant called Firehouse Subs on Brainard Road in Woodmere Village to honor that history. Mark's grandfather, Leo Matthews, Sr., was a member of the first Orange Village Fire Department and became Fire Chief in the 1970s. Mark's uncle, Bill Matthews, served as a volunteer fire fighter for the department for many years before becoming Assistant Chief in the 1990s. Both men have since passed away but Mark and Dana (who live in homes in Orange Village on property they inherited from them) honor them today through the display of many historical pictures of the Orange Village Fire Department and a large mural hanging prominently in the dining room of their Firehouse Subs restaurant.

In addition to serving delicious food, the Matthews' restaurant honors and supports local fire departments by awarding grants for life-saving equipment, fire prevention and educational tools to increase awareness of fire safety, providing financial resources for individuals pursuing public safety careers, and other grants to support the fire safety mission. This is a real tribute to their late family members and to the Orange Village Fire Department. If you stop in, be sure to admire the pictures of our fire department and thank the Matthews' for their support to the fine men and women that work hard every day to serve us. I felt very proud of the Village's fire department when I saw the pictures on public display and I know you will too.

# **Branch Chipping**

The Orange Village Service Department will be collecting branches and brush on July 29th and September 9th. This service is to aid the residents in the management of tree prunings and limbs that have fallen from their trees.

- ▲ DO NOT mix leaves, grass clippings or yard material
- ▲ Limbs should be placed with cut ends toward the road, no more than 2 feet high and 3 feet wide
- ▲ DO NOT make large piles

This service is not intended to chip complete trees.

## **Wood Chips**

Orange Village delivers wood chips free of charge to residents. An approximate load size is 10 yards. Requests are honored in the order they are received, while supplies last.




# Paper Shredding September 7, Landerwood Plaza, 9:00 am - noon

Clean up fallen seeds and hulls from around bird feeders to keep wild animals and rodents away.

## **Chagrin Dispatch Center is Moving**

The Chagrin Dispatch Center will be moving to University Hospital Bedford in December. The new dispatch center will have four dispatch stations with the capacity to increase to ten. This center will be a leader in the county's plan to consolidate dispatch centers. Chagrin Dispatch currently serves nine communities with other communities interested in joining. A portion of the cost for equipment purchases will be paid with a \$250,000 grant. There will be a great deal of savings realized by moving into this new state-of-the-art communications center.

# Rx Drug Drop Box Program Turn in your unused or expired medications

Orange Village Police Department and Cuyahoga County are pleased to announce a collaborative effort to protect your home and the environment from potentially dangerous medications with the Rx Drug Drop Box Program. Law enforcement is the only entity legally able to accept these medications and process them properly so that they do not fall into the wrong hands. Law enforcement takes control of and destroys drugs on a regular basis as part of their ongoing operations. In 2012 in Ohio, more than 1,500 people died from accidental prescription drug overdoses.



The RX Drug Drop Box Program is an opportunity for residents to deposit unused, unwanted, or expired prescription drugs. You may drop off your items Monday through Friday from 8:30 am to 4:00 pm at Orange Police Department, 4600 Lander Road. **Needles and liquids cannot be accepted.** 

# **Bicycle Helmet Safety**

Recently, at our Fire Department Open House we distributed free bicycle helmets to the children who attended. The Orange Village Fire Department in partnership with

University Hospitals Ahuja Medical Center realizes the importance of wearing a bicycle helmet even if the trip is as short as a pedal to the next-door neighbor's house. The generosity of University Hospitals provided our children with a free helmet and thus helped to educate Orange Village residents on the importance of this device.

Did you know that of the people killed in a bicycle accident in 2009 (latest year for full accredited statistics) that 91% of those killed were not wearing a helmet? Statistics also show that a mere 50% of cyclists wear a helmet every time they take a spin. In Orange you may be surprised to know that we have, in fact, recorded a death directly attributed to not wearing a helmet while cycling in our Village.

## Save the Rain for a Sunny Day with a Rain Barrel!

#### What's a Rain Barrel?

A rain barrel is a container used to collect and store rainwater that would otherwise be diverted to a storm drain. Collected rainwater can be used to water your lawn and gardens, and helps keep excess stormwater out of our creeks and streams. The use of rain is a cost-saving and environmentally sound measure.

#### Some Great Reasons to Use Rain Barrels:

- Water Conservation During the hot summer months, it's important to be sensible about water usage. By using a rain barrel, you lessen the amount of water flowing into our storm drains, sewer systems, local waterways and reduce the amount of water used towards watering lawns.
- Protection of Local Watersheds About 70 million pounds of pesticides are applied to lawns each year, contaminating stormwater runoff. Fertilizers and

- pesticides are a primary source of water pollution, and by collecting the rainwater before it hits the ground, you're helping to prevent that runoff from picking up and carrying these harmful pollutants into our local waterways.
- Natural Gardening Using rainwater to water your garden is natural and healthy! Plants love rainwater because it's naturally free of chlorine, fluoride and other chemicals found in treated water.

#### Where Can I Get a Rain Barrel?

## **BRAINARD ROAD WATER MAIN UPDATE**



Cleveland Water Department (CWD) is working on finalizing the contract for the Brainard Road Watermain Project. Bids were opened earlier this year for the

project. Once the contract has been finalized and the Contractor has been issued the Notice to Proceed, the Cleveland Water Department along with the Contractor and representative of the Village will schedule a Pre-Construction meeting to discuss the construction of the project.

At the Pre-Construction meeting the contractor will submit an anticipated timeline for the construction of the project and traffic maintenance will be discussed. Residents will be made aware of the construction schedule and any anticipated traffic changes during construction.

If you are a resident along Brainard Road or on Harvard Road between Brainard and Orangewood and would like to receive a water service connection to be installed as part of the main line construction, please contact the Village Engineer, Mr. Brian Mader at (216) 731-6255. If you tie into the main before CWD's contractor begins paving the street (estimated to occur late this year), you will not have to pay a separate water main tap-in fee, estimated to cost \$3,000. If you decide to tie in after that time, you will have to pay a contractor to perform this service.
