## The Future Orange Village Service Department

Architect Jack Bialosky of Bialosky & Partners Architects provided a presentation at the March 14th council meeting concerning the future service

department complex at 4680 Lander Road. Plans include construction of an 11,840 square foot maintenance garage, a salt storage building and partial renovation of the existing building.

The current garage building will remain intact and is currently being used for storage and a wood shop. The proposed construction is a metal roof

and sided building. This is a very efficient plan which satisfies the needs of the Village. The new building will include vehicle storage, mechanics

> bay with lift stations, wash bay and parts storage. The site work includes concrete aprons in the front and rear of the building and in front of the salt storage building. This project will also include

## Brainard Road Watermain Update

The Cleveland Water Department is finalizing plans for the Brainard Road Watermain which will extend from Miles to Harvard and along Harvard Road from Brainard to Orangewood. Residents along this proposed main will be contacted in the near future for an upcoming public meeting. The public meeting will inform residents about the project and the costs involved if you want to have public water extended to your property. ## Fire Safety Watermain Installed on Your Street?

Orange Village installed waterlines on certain roadways for the safety of our residents. If a watermain was installed on your street (Portions of Pike, Woodcrest, West Woodcrest and Jackson Road (Orangedale to Lander)) you have the ability to tie into the water main, if you wish. The main must extend all the way across your property frontage to be eligible. Please check with the Village Engineer at 216-731-6255 to see if your property qualifies and more information concerning the tap-in fee.

## **Placement of your Recycle Container**

Orange Village receives a very reasonable rate for recycling pick up because we have the capability of automated pick up. The truck has an arm that can pick up the container and empty it. The container must



be 2 feet from the street with the lid opening facing the street and 3 feet from other objects. If at all possible, please place recycling on one side of your driveway and trash on the other.





Dear Neighbors,

Though we have had an unusually mild winter (thus far), it sure feels good for spring to have officially arrived and we are already gearing up for another busy summer in Orange Village. We are planning on advancing many projects this year, from new service department facilities, to Music at the Muni, firework celebrations, road projects our wonderful Community Garden and many other recreational opportunities in the park. I would like to thank Orange Village resident,

Jody Kanter, for getting things started with an outstanding Chamber Music performance by many talented classical musicians and for donating a portion of the proceeds as seed money to get our amphitheater project underway.

### Infrastructure Projects

Planned infrastructure projects for the 2012 construction season include drainage projects on Pike Drive and Jackson Road (between Brainard & Orangedale,) necessary asphalt pavement reconstruction, installation of a water main on Brainard Road and the usual and ongoing maintenance and upkeep of all of our roads. This summer we will begin videotaping our storm sewers, to identify small problems before they have a chance to become big problems.

### Merger Study Update

The Orange Village, Moreland Hills, Pepper Pike & Woodmere Merger/Shared Services Study, being conducted by the Cuyahoga County Planning Commission, has been taking place over the past months with interviews and meetings with the mayors and all the department heads. The Planning Commission is collecting a lot of detailed information in order to understand exactly how our municipal services are delivered and where efficiencies and improvements can be realized. The most comprehensive summary of the Study, thus far, can be found in the 500 page application submitted to the Local Government Innovation Fund requesting additional dollars to hire subject matter experts. # RECYCLE PROGRAM UPDATE KEEP UP THE GOOD WORK!

Since 2008, Orange Village has had a co-mingled recycling program, which has resulted in a substantial increase to our recycling performance as a community. Those that have lived here long enough may recall that our recycling program prior to 2008 involved the separation of various recyclables and the placement of them into blue plastics bags or just piles of newspaper at the curb. While many residents participated, our recycling performance was still low, accounting for only about 10-15% of the waste stream we generated as a

community. In addition, trash pickup day often resulted in a community-wide mess, as newspapers and blue bags blew around the streets or animals got into the plastic bags.

Our community is in a waste disposal consortium that leverages the joint buying power of multiple communities by selecting a single contractor. Even so, our costs for waste disposal were rising. Most people know that landfill capacity is decreasing and opening new landfills is very difficult. This results in the fact that the waste disposal companies have to travel farther to dispose of our waste. With the rising cost of fuel, our disposal costs have been going up, which is expected to be the trend for years to come.

To counter these conditions, the Administration, with the support of the Council and the community, developed an innovative recycling program that is based on co-mingling all of our recyclables into a single container. With the help of the Cuyahoga County Solid Waste District, we researched the cost savings that might be achieved and competitively bid the costs of the recycling containers. Through this process, we believed that the cost of the containers could be recovered through the savings realized by less waste disposal. Because of the way we bid our contract, we only pay for the waste that is taken to the landfill, but do not have a fee for the materials that are recycled. This innovative program received County-wide recognition with a "Trash-Oscar" award in 2009.



We should all be very proud of the effort we have made to recycle. When you look around on trash pickup day you see a clean community, with almost every resident participating in the recycling program, evidenced by their blue container at the curbside. We now recycle almost 30% of the total waste stream generated in our community, which is more than double what we previously recycled. In addition, our recycling has resulted in real cost savings for our community. In 2011, we recycled 469 tons of material. Assuming an average disposal cost of \$39.44, we saved about \$18,500 in 2011 alone. As disposal costs keep rising, we can only expect to save more each year. That is tax revenue that can be used for other purposes.

So what else can we do you might ask? Here are several tips that maybe you have not thought of:

- 1) If you see your neighbor is not recycling, try and give them some encouragement to participate;
- 2) Look again at our recycling Calendar (mailed to every home under a grant from the County Solid Waste District) or on our website to see if there are other materials that you are not recycling;
- 3) Begin a yard compost program (see the County Solid Waste District or our Website for more information):
- 4) Lead a lower impact lifestyle by purchasing materials that come in recyclable packaging;
- 5) Give away, donate or find other uses (rags, packing, etc.) for old clothing. There are many nearby facilities that accept coats, clothing and shoes, which keeps these items out of our waste stream; and
- 6) Give away toys, bicycles and other games to similar donation centers.

Good luck in your efforts to increase recycling a benefit to you, your neighbors and your planet.

The Orange Village Service Department, will be collecting branches and brush on April 30th and June 11th. This service is to aid the residents in the management of tree prunings and limbs that have fallen from their trees.

- ▲ DO NOT mix leaves, grass clippings or yard material
- ▲ Limbs should be placed with cut ends towards the road, no more than 2 feet high and 3 feet wide
- **▲** DO NOT make large piles

This service is not intended to chip complete trees.

## **Wood Chips**

Orange Village delivers wood chips free of charge to residents. An approximate load size is 10 yards. Requests are honored in the order they are received, while supplies last.

This is a comprehensive women-only course that begins with awareness, prevention, risk reduction and risk

### NON-EMERGENCY SERVICES OFFERED BY THE ORANGE VILLAGE FIRE DEPARTMENT

- ⇔ CPR CLASSES: Basic CPR has proven itself to be an effective means for improving the outcome of sudden cardiac arrest. The Orange Village Fire Department can provide instruction to your group. Arrangements can be made by contacting Lt. Eric Strauss at 440-287-5074.
- HOME SAFETY INSPECTIONS: This service provides your family with some basic fire safety instruction including hazard recognition and the coordination of a Home Escape Plan. Contact Lt. Daniel Fritz at 440-287-5073 to arrange for this service.
- FIRE SAFETY TRAILER: The Orange Village Fire Department has access to several trailers in Northeast Ohio. We usually staff this trailer at the annual "Salute to Orange" held during Labor Day weekend. This trailer is a wonderful tool used to educate your children on proper escape techniques and hazard recognition. - FIRE STATION TOURS: Arrangements can be made to take a tour of your fire station. Remember that good fire safety practices include educating your children. ## **Spring Into Home Improvements**

As spring quickly approaches, many residents will start working on their exterior properties and structures, cleaning and clearing up remnants of winter. Spring cleaning is an annual ritual and we have outlined a few reminders to help you get started.

### ♦ Grass and Weeds

Every property owner is responsible for maintaining a manicured lot or parcel, keeping it free of all noxious weeds exceeding 6 inches, overgrown grass and woody vegetation.



### ◆ Exterior Areas

As part of your spring clean up, you should complete an inspection of your property noting conditions of your exterior structures and areas which have become weathered or worn and adversely alters the appearance of your home. Sanding and painting is an easy way to freshen the look of your home and property.

### **♦** Downed Trees or Limbs

Clearing downed trees and limbs is essential to the appearance of your property. You may remove the trees and limbs yourself or you may choose to hire a contractor. Trees and limbs cannot be placed with the branch chipping pick up that is offered by Orange Village. **Branch** chipping services during the spring are for small branches that have fallen. ### Inspections

Please note that the building department will begin inspections in May. Inspections target such violations as: peeling and chipping paint, falling or missing gutters, broken windows, cracked driveways and accumulation of junk and debris.

Your auditor will conduct a comprehensive home performance assessment, which can last up to four hours. This assessment provides you with valuable information regarding the existing condition of your home, and identifies areas where energy efficiency and home environment improvements can and should be made. The subsidized cost for the home performance assessment is \$50 (retail value \$500). These auditors are employed by GoodCents, the Program Administrator, and are certified by the Building Performance Institute (BPI). BPI is a national resource for building science technology that sets standards for assessing and improving the energy performance, as well as the health environment of homes.

To participate in the program, you must be an individually metered residential Dominion East Ohio customer with an active account, not on the Percentage of Income Payment Plan (PIPP), and/or not eligible for the Home Energy Assistance Program (HEAP). To qualify for rebates through the Program, you must use a GoodCents BPI certified auditor for the assessment and a participating contractor when making improvements.

## Keeping Drainage Channels Open.

As spring approaches residents are reminded that attention needs to be paid to the drainage swales and channels around their property. The following are a few suggestions to make sure water will properly drain when the spring rains arrive.

- 1. Check bordering swales and channels for debris. Many of these channels are along the sides and in the rear yards of the property.
- 2. Do not pile brush, branches, leaves or garbage in the swales areas or throw it into areas alongside the drainage channels.
- 3. Check drive pipes to make sure the inlet and outlet are open and free of restrictions.
- 4. Check basins in the front swale to ensure they are open. The Village performs a check of all the basins each year but problems can occur rapidly if debris starts to accumulate. Please contact the Service Department if you notice a problem in one of the basins.

Many of these suggestions will take only a few minutes to check on and very little effort to correct if a problem is spotted. Residents must understand that the drainage swales have outlet pipes from roof drains, foundation drains and septic lines. When a swale is full of water these outlet pipe often become submerged and could cause problems for residents.
