Heritage Home Program Low Interest Loans and More



From Mayor Kathy U. Mulcahy

Orange Village has participated in the Heritage Home ProgramSM of the Cleveland Restoration Society (CRS) for the past year with great results for homeowners. If your home is over 50 years old, I would like to remind you of this wonderful service.

The most important feature of the Heritage Home ProgramSM is that it offers free technical assistance and advice to the owners of homes that are over 50 years old. An employee of Cleveland Restoration Society (CRS) will come out, visit the house and evaluate the types of repairs that are necessary and appropriate for the house. The CRS employee will help identify the proper materials to be used for repairs and replacements that will be consistent with the architecture and style of the home. CRS will also provide advice and assistance if you would like to build an addition on to your home. CRS will suggest the proper materials and



colors so that the addition will enhance the house rather than detract from it.

The free technical assistance and advice offered by the Heritage Home ProgramSM is completely impartial and independent. CRS does not have any products or services that it sells to the homeowners and does not charge the homeowner for the advice. Sometimes CRS may advise the homeowner that replacement products being recommended by salesmen or contractors are not

necessary and that simple repairs are all that are needed.

CRS does not act as contractor on any project but CRS can provide a homeowner with a list of contractors that do the type of work that the homeowner needs. CRS can also review contractor bids and advise the homeowner about the bids.

Under this Program, CRS has provided technical advice and assistance to over 5,800 homeowners in Cleveland and Northeast Ohio on projects having a value of over \$124 Million.

Another feature of the Heritage Home ProgramSM is its low-interest equity loan program. These loans are made by either KeyBank (Key) or First Federal of Lakewood (FFL) to homeowners that are improving their houses as certified by CRS. The interest rate on these loans is a fixed rate of 1.85% from FFL or 2.0% from Key for up to 10 years. Heritage Home ProgramSM loans can be for interior as well as exterior repairs, maintenance, additions and modernizations. Kitchen and bath remodels are two popular uses of Heritage Home ProgramSM loans. The only things that cannot be done with a Heritage Home ProgramSM loan are luxury items such as swimming pools or hot tubs, vinyl siding or windows, driveways, and landscaping.

One Ring Scams

The most current alert we have received from the Attorney General is a **"One Ring Scam"**. This is another way individuals are attempting to take money from your pockets. These calls can cost you \$20.00 or more! Here's how it works.



You receive one ring on your home or cellular phone, you don't recognize the number so you call it back, when you do, the number is routed to an international number that authorizes a charge of up to \$20.00 dollars, with an additional \$9.00 per minute charge. The number you call back is usually a recording or advertisement designed to keep you on the phone, thus incurring more minutes.

Remember "Curiosity Killed the Cat". To avoid this from happening to you, don't call the number back. If someone really needs to get in touch with you, they will call you back.

Building Department Reminders

Over the past few weeks with the erratic weather changes the Building Department has fielded many questions on roofing and roof repair. The recent fluctuation in temperature and precipitation make for ideal conditions to experience roofing system failure. Living in Northeast Ohio, we will never experience ideal weather conditions for our roofs but there are things that you should always keep in mind when considering a repair or roof replacement.

- Research contractors; ask friends and neighbors, search the Better Business Bureau or Angie's List. A reputable contractor can make all the difference in having a successful repair or installation.
- When choosing a contractor ask questions; are they registered with the Village, do they get all proper permits and inspections, how long have they been in business, how long have they worked in the area.
- Ask about roof ventilation; one of the most common mistakes when roofing is installed or reinstalled is that ventilation is not taken into consideration. Ventilation is a key component to
 a <u>roofing system</u>. If a 30 year old roof that never had ice damage problems suddenly has
 ice buildup after a new roof was installed, most likely it can be attributed to improper roof
 ventilation.
- Compare materials from one contractor to the next; two contractors may have the same bottom line number but the materials may not be of the same quality. In roofing, just as in most anything else, you get what you pay for. Quality does matter.
- Warranty: Make sure your prospective contractor explains the terms of the warranty. Saying
 you have a five year warranty does you no good if it only covers materials and not labor, or if
 it just covers the shingles and not the ice guard or flashing. Details up front

can save you headaches in the future.

Asking a few questions and keeping these few things in mind can make the difference between a roof that will last another 30 years or one that leaks or has ice damage problems six months after installation.

Recycling Opportunities

Branch Chipping

The Orange Village Service Department, will be collecting branches and brush on April 28, June 9, July 28 and September 8. This service is to aid the residents in the management of tree prunings and limbs that have fallen from their trees.

- ▲ DO NOT mix leaves, grass clippings or yard material
- ▲ Limbs should be placed with cut ends towards the road, no more than 2 feet high and 3 feet wide
- ▲ DO NOT make large piles

This service is not intended to chip complete trees or for use by a commercial tree service provider.

Wood Chips

Orange Village delivers wood chips free of charge to residents. An approximate load size is 10 yards. Requests are honored in the order they are received, while supplies last.

Pulsepoint App - A Life Saver

hagrin Valley Dispatch and University Hospitals are now using Pulsepoint, a free app, that informs any CPR-trained user know when there is an emergency in which a person suffers a sudden cardiac arrest in a public place. App users within a quarter mile will receive a notification of the incident to step in until emergency workers arrive. In addition, they will be advised where the nearest automated external defibrillator (AED) is located. An AED is a portable device that checks the heart rhythm and can deliver an electric shock to restore a normal rhythm if necessary. Lt. Nick DiCicco said the Pulsepoint app and alert

is invaluable. "It could save somebody's life," he said. "If you get the defibrillation early, start CPR early, that's huge."

According to the Sudden Cardiac Arrest (SCA) Foundation there are nearly 1,000 SCA related deaths each day. Survival can be as high as 90 percent if treatment is initiated within the first 4–6 minutes. It can occur in outwardly healthy people. Early CPR, defibrillation and cardiac life support can all help reduce the risk of death and lasting damage.

If you do not know CPR, now is your chance to learn, the Orange Village Fire Department is offering CPR classes details are below.



FIRE DEPARTMENT OFFERS CPR CLASSES

The Orange Village Fire Department prides itself when it comes to community involvement. Whether it's our Open House (see back page for details), Holiday Gift Delivery event, Birthday Party celebrations or this year's Halloween Party, we strive to be engaged with the community. However, when it comes to the heightened success of any organization there must also be a "buy in" from the customers. In this case our "customers" are those we proudly serve. So you may be asking yourselves "What can I do?"

We're glad you asked.

By learning CPR, you greatly increase the chances for successful resuscitation when it comes to the full cardiac arrest victim. Our Paramedics are trained in advanced airway placement, IV access and Advanced Cardiac Life Support (ACLS) including the administration of over 35 different medications. While we deal with a wide array of medical emergencies, the most critical event takes place when we encounter a patient in cardiac arrest. We are proud of our skill level but fully understand that our outcomes are often dependent upon the interventions that take place before our rescue squad arrives.

Please consider signing up for one of our free CPR courses, which will be held on:

SATURDAY MAY 10TH 8AM - NOON

SATURDAY JULY 12TH 8AM - NOON

(Courses held at Village Hall. Refreshments provided.)

We will be going over "Hands Only" CPR which has proven to be an incredibly effective skill. Our Instructors will use "real world" examples to illustrate the difference you can make. Course participants will be presented with information on a range of topics related to the cardiac arrest patient. Additionally, participants will see the high tech tools used by the Paramedics serving their community.

License and Registration




Please make sure your driver's license and registration has Orange Village as your city. Each community has a permissive tax that is to be used by the county and community per ORC Chapter 4504, which includes planning, constructing, improving maintaining and repairing public roads, highways and streets.

Orange Village is unique in the sense that we do not have a post office and we have three different zip codes in our community that are related to different communities. You may notice when you try to mail a letter to Orange Village zip code 44022 you will be prompted to change the city to Chagrin Falls, that is because 44022 is the Chagrin Falls Post Office. This is also the case with 44122 (Beachwood) and 44128 (Warrensville Heights). Because of this fact, it is important that when you apply for your driver's license or license plates you inform them that you live in Orange Village and not the community associated with the zip code.

Keep Your Yard "Green" and Our Water Clean!

Spring cleaning and lawn maintenance is probably on the minds of many now that winter is on its way out. Start the season off right with habits to maintain not only a healthy, natural lawn but also the health of your streams, rivers, and lakes!

Don't guess...soil test! Spring and fall are great times to test your soil and see what its needs are. Most lawns don't need as much fertilizer as folks think. A soil test can save you money and time and keep unnecessary fertilizers out of the water.

Consider composting! Turning your yard waste into compost is an easy, cost-effective way to give your lawn and soil the nutrients it needs. You're also doing your rivers a favor by reducing the amount of grass clippings, leaf litter and other organic pollution that would be otherwise clogging up storm drains and streams.

Don't wait, aerate! Core aeration in the springtime increases the movement of water, oxygen, and nutrients into the soil, which allows plants to grow deeper, healthier roots. An aerated lawn soaks up more water, which might help clear up that wet spot in your yard!
