2016 HIGHLIGHTS

- ☆ Orange Village was awarded a \$150,000 grant towards the replacement of our playground surface and the purchase and installation of new play equipment. Look for a new playground in the Orange Village community park in 2017.
- ☆ Under the leadership of Seargent Mike Roberts, the Child Abduction Response Team (C.A.R.T.) was re-established in the Chagrin Valley with excellent results.
- ☆ Safety officers were trained and equipped with Narcan to counter the heroin epidemic in our region. Several officers were called upon to use it in 2016 with success.
- ☆ Safety officers were trained in Unmanned Air Vehicle (UAV) and emergency radio communications in 2016. This will enable our Chagrin Valley police departments to add an UAV unit to its operations.
- ☆ Orange Village Employee Manual has been updated and revised.
- ☆ All of the Orange Village departments worked co-operatively together and regionally in preparation for the successful RNC that took place in Cleveland in July, 2016. This was no small effort on everyone's part and we are so pleased it went so well and without incident.
- ☆ Saw increased participation in all of our community events.
- ☆ Employed 2 new Service Department employees, 1 new Building Department administrator, 4 new firefighters and

- 1 new police officer.
- ☆ Rolled out a new and improved Orange Village website. Updated and streamlined for easier use and to make it simpler for residents to find the information they need. New features were added to make access to community resources more convenient.
- ☆ Installed a new LED message board outside Village Hall to communicate with our residents.
- ☆ Earned an excellent report and an unqualified opinion on the State of Ohio's audit of our 2014 & 2015 financial reports.
- ☆ Negotiated a three year Collective Bargaining Agreement with our Police Union.
- ☆ Complete re-organization of our Building Department with new software, forms and procedures under the leadership of a fulltime building official.
- ☆ The Pinecrest development began construction in 2016 and we continue to ensure it meets the standards and commitments established by our development agreement.
- ☆ The Jacobs Group has submitted its Chagrin Highlands Master Plan for the 77 acres on the South side of Harvard, adjacent to 1271. The approval process is almost completed for a hotel and two restaurants, which should begin in 2017. Eventually, the plans also call for Class A office space.





Income tax collections are the Village's primary source of revenue for all essential services. Every department within the Village relies on income tax collections for a major portion of their funding. Orange Village collects a 2.0% income tax on earned income within the Village, which is applied to gross salaries, wages, personal services, compensation and net income of for-profit organizations that conduct business in Orange Village. Orange Village residents are generally required to pay income taxes on income they earn outside the Village, but are given a 60% credit for income taxes paid to the municipality(s) in which they work up to a limit of 1.5%.

Distribution of Orange Village Property Tax

A fundamental difference between Orange Village and the Orange School District is the main funding source used by each entity for operating purposes. Orange Village relies primarily on income tax revenues. Orange Schools relies mostly on property taxes. However, property taxes are still a vital component of Orange Village's funding sources.

Property tax in Orange Village is based on the County-assessed value of all parcels of land within each taxing district. The assessment of value is administered by the Cuyahoga County Fiscal Officer. The County Fiscal Officer determines an assessed value, which is 35% of the appraised market value for each parcel.

The value is updated every three years based on the average price that surrounding or similar properties sold for within the previous three-year period. Every six years, the County Auditor revisits all properties to re-appraise the value of each piece of land based on any building additions or major improvements. The last re-appraisal of property values occurred in 2015.








COMPARISON OF RESIDENTIAL TAX RATES Calculated as a % of market value

The staff receives and records all monies paid to the Village, pays all Village bills, prepares paychecks and payroll reports. The department records and reports on all Village finances.

As Tax Administrator, Mitch Adell serves as a liaison between our resident and the Regional Income Tax Agency, as needed, to resolve any tax-related issues.

Cathy Kups handles all human resource, accounts receivable and accounts payable issues.

NEW ADDITION TO THE PARK!

Orange Village was awarded a \$150,000 grant from the State of Ohio Department of Natural Resources NatureWorks grant. We will replace the existing 25 year old play area and surface, located in the park at 4600 Lander Road, with a new and improved play structure that is handicap accessible and a poured-in-place rubberized surface. We also plan to construct a new section for the swings that includes two PlayShare swings which allows adults and children to swing together.





This project would not be possible without the assistance of the many residents who contributed to this project from several different committees and provided their input. The Service Department hopes to begin site work in early spring. We are waiting for final approval of funding from the Ohio Controlling Board before the project can begin.

DON'T BE A VICTIM - PROTECT YOURSELF AGAINST CRIMES

There have been several reports of carjackings and break-ins in the adjacent areas. The Orange Village Police Department would like to offer some suggestions to help keep you safe:

Protect your home

- If you have an alarm system, USE IT (even at night).
- Lock your doors and windows when home or away. (Don't forget rear sliding doors, take a strong dowel, steel bar or two-by-four and slide it into the back groove.)
- Remove keys from the ignition of your vehicles (cars in the garage too).
- Use perimeter lighting (motion lights).
- Prepare for vacation. Stop mail and newspapers, contact the police department for a vacation watch. Alert neighbors you trust about your trip and ask that they keep an eye on your property during that time. Do not post your vacation plans on social media.
- Be observant!

Protect Yourself from a Carjacking

- In traffic, look around for possible avenues of escape. Keep some distance between you and the vehicle in front so you can maneuver easily if necessary-about one-half of your vehicle's length. (You should always be able to see the rear tires of the vehicle in front of you.)
- When stopped, use your rear and side view mirrors to stay aware of your surroundings. Also keep your doors locked and windows up. This increases your safety and makes it more difficult for an attacker to surprise you.

Keep a pen and paper in your car to be able to write down the vehicle color, make, model and license plate.

Accidents are one ruse used by attackers to control a victim. Below are common attack plans:

The Bump—The attacker bumps the victim's vehicle from behind. The victim gets out to assess the damage and exchange information. The victim's vehicle is taken.

Good Samaritan—The attacker(s) stage what appears to be an accident. They may simulate an injury. The victim stops to assist, and the vehicle is taken.

The Ruse—The vehicle behind the victim flashes its lights or the driver waves to get the victim's attention. The attacker tries to indicate that there is a problem with the victim's car. The victim pulls over and the vehicle is taken.

The Trap—Carjackers use surveillance to follow the victim home. When the victim pulls into his or her driveway, the attacker pulls up behind and blocks the victim's car.

Pull over only when you reach a safe public place. Think before stopping to assist in an accident. It may be safer to call and report the location, number of cars involved, and any injuries you observed.

With a little effort, observation, and team work, we can reduce the instances of successful burglaries and carjackings and increase our chances of apprehension at the same time.



Snow Parking Ban

Orange Village would like to remind residents that there is a Village wide parking ban during snowstorms that exceed 2 inches. Code Section 351.03 states that no person shall stand or park a vehicle, except when necessary to avoid conflict with other traffic or to comply with the provisions of this Traffic Code, or while obeying the directions of a police officer or traffic control device. This allows for the Village crews to plow the streets safely and to maintain access for all emergency vehicles.

Fire Department Winter Safety Tips

The Orange Village Fire Department would like to take this opportunity to remind our residents of a few Winter Safety Tips. "Help Us To Help You" has been our motto for several years now. Please take this opportunity to discuss the tips below with all members in your home.

- 1) As storms roll in and heavy snow and ice become a reality, it is a great time to remind children (and adults) that ALL DOWNED WIRES should be considered deadly. Never approach a downed line even if you suspect it is a phone line or cable TV line. Remember that if a tree has fallen there is a decent chance it may also be entangled with live wires. Basic rule.....stay away and don't touch.
- 2) Our Village has many small ponds, medium ponds and small lakes. Just take a peek with Google Earth and see how many are within walking distance to your property. Remind children to NEVER walk on ANY ice unless a parent has determined such action is safe. We suggest that you do not allow children on the ice at any time. Note where ponds are fed and understand that this area has water movement and, even with thick ice elsewhere on the pond, ice may be very thin at these locations.
- 3) Overloaded extension cords may have recently contributed to a house fire in our area. NEVER run extension cords underneath carpeting. Never overload the cords. Throw away (never tape) old extension cords. The use of candles can also be attributed to many house fires each year. Never leave a candle in an unoccupied room.
- 4) Lastly, be a good neighbor. If we are experiencing a bad storm or lengthy stretch of sub zero weather please check in with elderly neighbors and those who are physically challenged.



With the cold and snowy season upon us there are a few precautions one can take to make it through safely. Stairways should become a point of focus. The number one cause of injury in a home occurs on stairways. Improper lighting, loose handrails, clutter left on steps and of course slipping on snow and ice covered exterior stairs are the primary reasons.

To help alleviate these sources of disaster, perform maintenance and be observant of potential problems:

- Assure proper lighting and replace burned out light bulbs
- → Tighten loose handrails
- ♦ Keep items off steps at all times

The building code for stairways has changed in the last few years and an older home's stairway may not be installed with the added safety required by today's standards. Especially for little children, spindle spacing and guardrail height can be a safety hazard.

The new standards are a maximum 4 inch opening between spindles and a minimum 36 inch height for the top guardrail above the finished floor. Many older homes currently have 6 inch opening between spindles and 34 inch height for the guardrail above the finished floor.

When the snow comes, as it surely will, be mindful of those that may need a clear access to your door and make sure your address is visible from the street.

These are just a few of the things that can be a life saver.

We encourage you to sign up for emergency (highly recommended) and/or general notifications calls/texts/emails. Emergency information would include boiling alerts for water (happened recently), gas leaks and any other incidents where rapid and accurate notification is essential. General notifications will include reminders of paper shredding, Music at the Muni events, changes to trash schedules and other non-emergency items.



If you do not have access to a computer and would like to receive any of these notifications or if you are currently receiving notifications and wish to be removed from the non-emergency notifications, please contact Anna Girardi at 440-287-5131.

COMMUNITY GARDEN SIGN UP

The Orange Community Garden has been a haven for gardeners for the past 7 years. The garden flourished this year due to fellow gardeners assisting one another and offering informative monthly garden meetings. The Garden is currently part of the OSU Extension program which provides gardening education and answers to your gardening questions. The purpose is to provide up-to-date information on whom to contact if your alarm sounds. A typed or neatly printed form or online registration must be submitted every year.

Registration takes place from now until January 31, 2017. You may complete the form on-line at www.orangevillage.com or stop by the Orange Village Police Department between the hours of 8:00 a.m. and 4:00 p.m. Monday through Friday.

We are no longer charging an annual fee for registration, but you should still register your alarm. If you have any questions, please call 440-498-4401.
