






He worked in Lakewood for 17 years as a residential and commercial inspector, progressing to Assistant Building Commissioner before becoming the Chief Building Commissioner in Olmsted Falls. In August of 2015, he became Chief Building Official in Woodmere and is now our Chief Building Official in Orange Village.

COMMUNITY PARK:

There is a lot of activity this summer. Our service department has been working very diligently constructing the wonderful new playground area. We will let everyone know as soon as it is ready to be played upon. I can't wait to see the children enjoying themselves on this exciting project. Due to the heavy and frequent rains, it has taken longer than expected to complete, thus pushing back construction of a new pickleball court, which is still planned for this year. Hopefully, by the end of summer, we will be announcing the opening of that new recreational facility as well.

RECREATIONAL TRAILS:

Our Service Director and Village Engineer continue to visit residents along the main roads of the Village where the future recreational trails are going to be installed. We are working on the design of six-foot wide meandering trails on one side of each of the main streets to be constructed in 2018. We have had multiple public meetings and communications as well. By the end of this year, we will have final plans in place for residents' review. Construction will take place next year. By the end of 2018, our residents will have a safe way to travel on foot around the Village.

COMMERCIAL DEVELOPMENTS:

Our Village is booming with the construction of Pinecrest and, soon, the Chagrin Highlands project will be underway. The Northeast quadrant of the Village will be a heavily commercial area with many new restaurants, shops, hotels, apartments, etc... We are doing everything possible to minimize the impact on our residential areas, while maximizing the benefits to our residents of having these amenities in town. These projects will begin to open in Spring, 2018 for our patronage and enjoyment.

Slyman's will be opening in the old Red Robin's building later this summer. The Village Auto Wash is getting a complete renovation and update soon.

This is just a small sampling of all the things happening in Orange Village. Earlier this year, I became a Board Member of Destination Cleveland, which is the Travel & Tourism/Convention Agency for the region. It's been exciting and enlightening to learn about all the wonderful things happening throughout Cuyahoga County. This is a great time to be living here. We have a lot to be proud of and a lot to look forward to.

HOME MAINTENANCE:

We need everyone to take pride in our community and do their share by maintaining their own homes and properties. This has been an ongoing concern. BICYCLE SAFETY

BICYCLISTS - ROAD SAFETY

The laws of the road apply to bicyclists just as they do for all other motorists. If you don't follow the rules of the road you may be cited in traffic court for the infraction.

These rules are in effect for the safety of YOU, the cyclist, and everyone else on the roadway.

NEIGHBORLY ADVICE

Orange Village has an ordinance that was enacted to limit the hours for construction due to noise. The same holds true for residential areas such as loud noises from outdoor music and/or the operation of yard and household maintenance equipment. The restriction hours are from 9pm to 7am weekdays and 9pm to 9am Saturdays and Sundays.

Please be considerate of your neighbors and try and keep all loud noises down to a minimum in the evening. **Orange Village Ordinance 509.08**

CONTAINER RENTAL SERVICE OFFERED

Orange Village will drop off an 8 or 10 yard container through November (weather permitting) to help dispose of brush, yard waste, construction debris or household debris. You cannot mix items in the container but you can choose from several different types of materials to dispose. Costs vary depending on the items that will be

Recycling Opportunities

Branch Chipping

The Orange Village Service Department, will be collecting branches and brush on July 24 and September 11.

- ▲ DO NOT mix leaves, grass clippings or yard material
- ▲ Limbs should be placed with cut ends towards the road, no more than 2 feet high and 3 feet wide
- **▲** DO NOT make large piles

This service is not intended to chip complete trees or for use by a commercial tree service provider.

Wood Chips

Orange Village delivers wood chips free of charge to residents. An approximate load size is 10 yards. Requests are honored in the order they are received, while supplies last. Place your order online at www.orangevillage.com or call Village Hall at 440-498-4400.

Scrap Tire Collection - Sept. 5-29

The Service Department will collect tires that are removed from the rim. You may drop off your tires Monday through Friday from 7:00 am to 3:00 pm at 4680 Lander Road.

Computer equipment will be accepted Monday through Friday in August from 7:00 am to 3:00 pm at the Service Department Recycle Center, 4680 Lander Road.

HOW TO DISPOSE OF FLUORESCENT BULBS

Orange Village will no longer be accepting fluorescent bulbs. Compact fluorescent (CFL) bulbs can be disposed of for free at any Home Depot or Lowe's Home Improvement store.

Fire Department Receives Alzheimer's Training

The Members of the Orange Village Fire Department often deal with a myriad of medical emergencies. As Paramedics we are charged with the dual role of performing medical interventions while also dealing with many different personality traits, age groups and cognitive abilities. In an

effort to enhance our care associated with those experiencing dementia and Alzheimer's disease, we arranged for additional training so that we can better serve our residents. Members of your Fire Department underwent an advanced training session last month. Sarah Sobel, Public Policy and Outreach Coordinator for the Alzheimer's Association (Cleveland Area Chapter) conducted the training session. Below are a few statistics related to this disease:

- 1 in 9 individuals over the age of 65 have Alzheimer's disease.
 45% of these individuals are not formally diagnosed. This fact drives home the importance for our Paramedics to recognize and enhance their interactions when encountering those impacted by this disease.
- Alzheimer's is currently the 6th leading cause of death in the United States. There is currently no known cure.
- There are 210,000 Ohioans living with Alzheimer's with nearly 600,000 caregivers providing support.

According to Sarah, "First Responders are in a unique position to be dementia friendly. By being supportive and inclusive in their approach, Paramedics will function with an increased understanding of how to manage emergency situations and crisis intervention for individuals with Alzheimer's and related dementia." Sarah also points out that, when properly trained, Paramedics will "Strengthen relationships with residents and be perceived as a trustworthy and reliable community partner."

Daniel Fritz, Orange Village Assistant Fire Chief, knows first hand how this disease affects the patient and other family members. "My Grandfather suffered from Alzheimer's disease. It was a very difficult time for my mother and our extended family circle. If our department can provide improved care and improved emotional support during medical emergencies then we can better treat those we have taken an oath to protect."

The Orange Village Fire Department is constantly exploring ways to cater its training efforts to focus on the entire community. Contractor Registration

Why does my contractor have to register?

Orange Village requires contractors to register in order to protect you, the homeowner. Orange Village requires that registered contractors provide proof of insurance coverage to protect property owners, neighbors and themselves in case of an accident. Electricians, Heating and Cooling, Refrigeration and Plumbing contractors must also provide a copy of their state license when registering to prove that they are trained and qualified.



Since 1983, Council has required all contractors and sub-contractors to be registered, even if the owner or another contractor has obtained the permit.

Homeowners may obtain permits for their own work without registering, but may not secure a permit for work being done by a contractor.

Proper Disposal of Yard Waste

Grass clippings. Leaves. Sticks. Wood Chips.

These and other yard waste may not sound like they would be harmful to creeks or the animals that live in them. Homeowners and landscapers may even think that dumping these natural, organic materials on streambanks helps to slow erosion. But in reality, they can cause major problems, especially when they are dumped in smaller backyard streams and roadside ditches.

As these materials decompose, they consume oxygen, depleting the oxygen supply for fish, frogs and salamanders. Additionally, streams with low levels of oxygen often have a foul odor. Wood chips and pine needles can increase the acidity of the water. As these materials pile up on the streambank, they smother and kill vital streamside vegetation, making streambanks more susceptible to erosion.

And while logs and branches in the stream can provide beneficial habitat and channel stability, smaller sticks, leaves and grass clippings often float downstream and clog culverts or bridges, leading to localized flooding or new erosion. For this same reason, yard waste should never be dumped or blown into a storm drain or roadside ditch.

So, how should you dispose of yard waste?

REDUCE the amount of yard waste you generate: Consider using a mulching mower so that grass clippings are chopped up small, making bagging or otherwise disposing of them unnecessary. This has the added benefit of adding organic material back into your lawn soil. Leaves can often be mulched and incorporated into your lawn using this technique as well.

<u>COMPOST</u>: Grass clippings, weeds, leaves and many other yard and garden wastes can be composted right in your own back yard, along with plant-based kitchen scraps. Techniques range from a simple backyard compost pile to bins or even digesters that can also handle pet wastes. Finished compost can then be used to add fertility to lawn, garden and landscaped areas. Visit cuyahogarecycles.org for more information about backyard composting.
