## 2018 HIGHLIGHTS

- ☆ Awarded a contract to construct recreational trails on the main roads throughout the village and the commencement of actual construction on Lander Road between Emery and Miles.
- ☆ Successful opening of the Pinecrest mixed use development. A variety of new restaurants, events, and shopping options have been introduced to our community and region.
- ☆ The opening and staffing of Orange Village's satellite safety station located in the Pinecrest development.
- ☆ Cooper's Hawk Winery opened as part of the Chagrin Highlands South project and a Drury Hotel is under construction.
- ☆ The opening of a pickle ball court in the Orange Village Community Park.
- ☆ Hired our first full-time finance director, two police officers, 2 fire officers and 1 part-time office personnel. Two service department employees completed their training to also serve as members of our fire department.
- ☆ Promoted 4 officers in the fire department, which increased our staffing to 3 captains and 3 lieutenants. Promoted 2 officers in the police department and added another full-time detective position.
- ☆ Sold 4170 Lander Road.
- ☆ Resurfacing of Orangetree subdivision and Orangedale Road. Final restoration will be completed in the spring.
- ☆ Received multiple grants totaling over \$236,000 including: Cuyahoga County Solid Waste District, road maintenance reimbursement from Cuyahoga County, NOPEC, First Energy, Great Lakes Restoration Initiative Tree grant, State Fire and EMS Grants, Cuyahoga County SRAD/OVI Reduction Task Force, Cuyahoga County Juvenile Court Community Diversion Program Assistance, Bureau of Workers Compensation, and Bulletproof Vest Partnership.
- ☆ University Hospital donated a life saving Lucas Device and nine AED's.
- ☆ Completed inspection of 1076 catch basins, picked up 2200 yards of leaves and delivered 900 yards of leaf compost.
- ☆ Offered several well-attended community events: Salute to Orange, Halloween, Movie at the Muni, concert at Pinecrest's Central Park, neighborhood block parties, community garage sale, and shredding days (just to name a few).
- ☆ We saw a very significant increase in Building Department activity. In 2018 we issued 566 contractor registrations (in 2017 we issued 263). Inspections increased by 700 in 2018. There are 16 homes built or currently under construction in 2018.
- ☆ Completed a State of Ohio audit of our 2016 and 2017 fiscal years.
- ☆ Created a "Welcome" packet for new businesses to Orange Village.

A very productive year in Orange Village is coming to an end. The accomplishments listed on the front page are just a small sampling of the achievements made in 2018. Our dedicated employees continue to work hard on behalf of our community.

We are already focusing on our goals for 2019 which include:

- ❖ Introduction of Touch-a-Truck/Health and Wellness Fair on Sunday, June 23.
- ❖ Reconstruction of the service annex building to house the building department and repurposing their current space to physically expand the police department.
- ❖ Accept delivery and place into service our new custom pumper for the fire department.
- ❖ Completion of a network of recreational trails throughout the Village.
- ❖ Installation of additional amenities in our community park including dugouts for the ball fields.
- ❖ Review our current financial software to determine the most efficient and streamlined product that will work for Orange Village.
- ❖ Identify opportunities to increase the working relationship between business and government.
- ❖ Review and update administrative job descriptions and policies.

### ***Recreational Trails Update***

Construction of the Village Trails commenced in October. The contractor has completed tree removal and the required drainage work along Lander Road. Trail installation on Lander Road has been poured outside of the driveways from Miles Road to Emery Road with the exception of Village Hall.

Unfavorable weather this fall has slowed down the progress of trail installation. Trail construction will resume when weather permits.


During the winter months some sewer work associated with the trail and additional tree removal will take place on Harvard Road, Brainard Road, and Emery Road. Traffic will be maintained during this construction as these are just day-to-day operations.

## DEPOSIT REQUIRED FOR PAVILION/ROOM RESERVATIONS

Orange Village Council passed Ordinance 2018-41 concerning a cleaning and repair deposit for use of Village municipal facilities. The ordinance states that residents that are granted an Official Village Permit shall be liable for all damages during their use.

Residents reserving the room must complete the Facility Use Permit and provide a \$200 refundable security deposit when booking a room or pavilion. Residents will receive their security deposit refund within thirty (30) days after the event. The area must be cleaned and in good repair in order to receive your refund.

## Plastic Bag Ordinance #2018-43

At the December 5th Council Meeting, Orange Village passed Ordinance 2018-43 which requires businesses in the Village to stop using single-use plastic bags. Plastic bags cause tremendous harm to our environment, and council decided to be proactive in doing our part to curb this problem. To the best of our knowledge, we are the first municipality in Ohio to adopt this type of legislation.

### Recycle Challenge

The Orange Village Service Department is challenging all residents to become better recyclers. The reward "a cleaner and healthier environment".

Recycling has become a much debated topic that has turned into a national problem as contaminated material continues to plague the industry. China, the leader in receiving the world's recyclables has had enough. The China sword, known to people in the trash world has shut down the import of recyclables. Contaminated material is the reason why. When non-recyclables are mixed into the recycle tote, it is sent to the material recovery facility for sorting. If items such as garden hoses and plastic bags damage and jam the equipment, contaminated loads cannot be sorted and must be sent to the landfill.

The days of all plastics 1-7 being recyclable is no longer a valid statement. We can only recycle plastic bottles and jugs. This is due to China's import ban on mixed plastics. This ban has limited the types of plastics that can be recycled nationwide.

## Resident Spotlight

### *Benjamin Richman, M.D.*

Dr. Ben Richman, his wife Ellen and their three children, Steve, Spencer, and Joanne, moved into their first home in Orange Village in 1971. Prior to that they lived in many different cities for college, graduate school, medical school, and orthopedic surgery residency. The army “intervened” in the middle of Ben’s residency and he was deployed to South Korea where he served as the orthopedic surgeon for the army’s largest hospital in Korea located near the North/South demilitarized zone. To keep his family together, Ben found a house in a nearby village where Ellen and the children joined him for a year, enjoying the opportunity to experience a different culture.

One of the highlights of that year occurred when the South Korean Secretary of Defense asked for help for his wife who was unable to walk. This was before the days of artificial knees and hips, but Ben performed an operation which had never been done at the hospital. His patient was able to walk away from her wheelchair for the first time in years. In appreciation the Secretary of Defense invited Ben and Ellen to the Presidential palace in Seoul for a reception with Korean President Park. Surrounded by dignitaries from many nations, the President sought out Ben, shook his hand, and presented him with a Presidential Plaque.

Upon discharge from the army, the family moved to Orange and the children all attended and graduated from the Orange Schools. Ben completed his orthopedic residency at University Hospitals and went into private practice at Marymount Hospital. Known as “Gentle Ben” by the surgical staff, Ben’s patients showed their appreciation for his quiet manner and listening skills with baked goods, home-made afghans, wood carvings and other gifts and letters. One of his patients whom he treated many times as a child is now a well-known Cleveland Clinic orthopedic surgeon. He tells his family that he was inspired to go into orthopedics due to Ben’s warmth and expert care.

Ben served as the team doctor for the Cleveland Crunch indoor soccer team, the Cleveland Lumberjacks indoor hockey team and several area high school football teams. He and Ellen enjoyed skiing, biking, tennis, ballroom dancing, and spending time with their six grandchildren. During retirement they spent many winters in Naples, Florida where they started a new business, the Naples Chocolate Stroll, a walking chocolate-tasting tour. Unfortunately, Ben had a severe stroke two years ago and is now learning to walk again. In the good weather his neighbors can track his progress as he cautiously walks down the street, adding one more house at a time to his route!

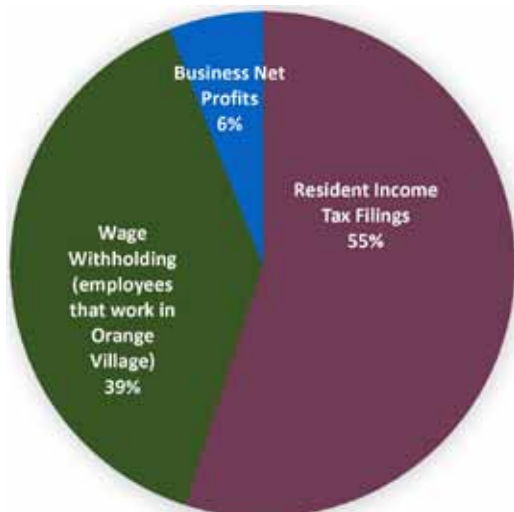

## 2017 TOTAL GENERAL FUND REVENUES

Income tax collections are the Village's primary source of revenue for all essential services. Every department within the Village relies on income tax collections for a major portion of their funding. Orange Village collects a 2.0% income tax on earned income within the Village which is applied to gross salaries, wages, personal services, compensation and net income of for-profit organizations that conduct business in Orange Village. Orange Village residents are generally required to pay income taxes on income they earn outside the Village, but are given a 60% credit for income taxes paid to the municipality(s) in which they work up to a limit of 1.5%.



## 2017 TOTAL GENERAL FUND EXPENDITURES

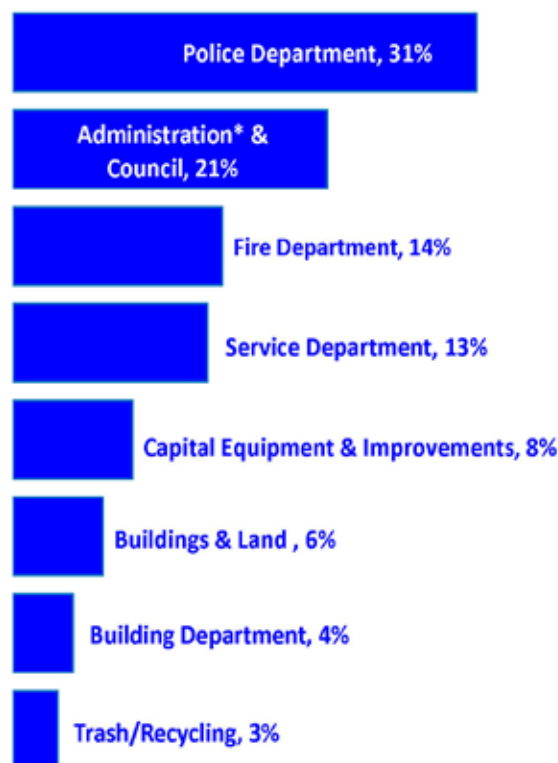
### GENERAL FUND

## Distribution of Orange Village Property Tax

A fundamental difference between Orange Village and the Orange School District is the main funding source used by each entity for operating purposes. Orange Village relies primarily on income tax revenues. Orange Schools rely mostly on property taxes. However, property taxes are still a vital component of Orange Village's funding sources.

Property tax in Orange Village is based on the county-assessed value of all parcels of land within each taxing district. The assessment of value is administered by the Cuyahoga County Fiscal Officer. The County Fiscal Officer determines an assessed value, which is 35% of the appraised market value for each parcel.

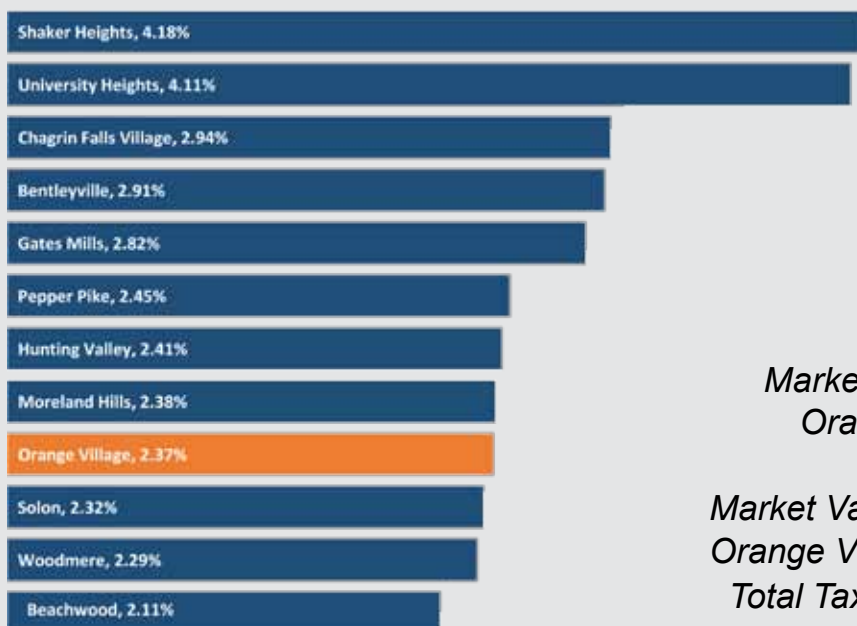
The value is updated every three years based on the average price that surrounding or similar properties sold for within the previous three-year period. Every six years, the County Auditor revisits all properties to re-appraise the value of each piece of land based on any building additions or major improvements. The last re-appraisal of property values occurred in 2018.

An Orange Village homeowner will pay 2.37% of the market or appraised value of their home for property taxes. The property tax is calculated by multiplying the market value of the property by the tax rate.

## ANATOMY OF A FIRE

While we certainly hope that you never have to face the tragedy of experiencing a house fire, we want to take a moment to explain how a response is initiated. The emphasis is always on prevention and we offer tips throughout the year that will help keep you safe. However, by understanding the process involved in a typical house fire response, we hope to illustrate the resources that are in place for your protection should something go wrong.

**2:00 a.m.** After waking up to smoke detector activation, residents exit home and meet at the predetermined family meeting place.

**2:03 a.m.** Resident calls 911 and speaks to dispatcher at Chagrin Valley Dispatch Center (CVD). Trained dispatchers ask relevant questions while simultaneously dispatching the Orange Village Fire Department.



**2:04 a.m.** Firefighters at the Lander Road station are notified through their Fire Station Alert System. Additionally, the Chief and Assistant Chief are immediately advised of the structure fire through an additional alerting system and they prepare to leave their personal homes. Since the nature of this call meets pre-determined criteria, CVD initiates a second alarm and immediately dispatches three other neighboring departments.

**2:05 a.m.** All off-duty members of the department receive a “station call back” request so that they can come in from home and staff the station for other calls or to possibly assist with the actual fire incident.

**2:06 a.m.** Firefighters from Orange Village and mutual aid departments climb into their apparatus and touch the screens on Ipads which provide routing and specific address mapping. At this time Dispatch advises the Lieutenant or Captain of all other apparatus that is responding and any updates from additional 911 calls.

**2:08 a.m.** The Chief and/or Assistant Chief advise Dispatch that they are also enroute to the scene and begin establishing the Command structure for overseeing the response.

**2:10 a.m.** Orange Village Firefighters step off their apparatus at the scene and immediately report conditions over the radio. Thanks to prompt dispatching from CVD, the firefighters can hear incoming sirens from other fire departments who are also responding. The Lieutenant or Captain confirms the safety of all occupants and performs the 360 degree size-up by walking around entire home and checking all windows with stream light. Other members are powering up the thermal imager, grabbing tools, and stretching hose lines as they await instructions from the Officer based on his 360 size-up.

**2:12 a.m.** Additional departments are arriving and awaiting orders from the Incident Commander. The fire is now being attacked, ventilation is in progress, utilities are being secured and a Command structure is in place.

The above assumes ideal conditions and the timeframes are obviously subject to weather and other constraints. Again, our focus is to help you prevent such an incident, but the reality is that we also have to help you prepare. By knowing the basics of a typical response, we hope we have illustrated the resources that are in place for your safety.

## Holiday Tree and **Lights** Recycling

Orange Village Service Department will accept old or non-working holiday lights December 7, 14, 21, 28, 2018 and January 4 and 11, 2019 at the Recycle Center, 4680 Lander Road from 7 a.m. to 3 p.m.

They will also be collecting your natural holiday trees separately from your trash/recycling. Please prepare your tree for collection by following these simple guidelines:

- \* Place tree with trunk facing the road.
- \* Remove lights, ornaments, tinsel and other trimmings from branches.
- \* Remove tree stands, metal or wood.
- \* Do not bag your tree.

## PLACEMENT OF SNOW AND DEBRIS

With winter coming we can rest assured we will have plenty of snow to remove from our driveways and parking lots. Please remember to obey our ordinance concerning placement of snow and debris. Also make sure any snow removal contractors you hire are registered with Village Hall.



### 725.02 PLACING SNOW OR DEBRIS NEAR FIRE HYDRANTS AND/OR ROADWAYS

(a) No person shall transport, snow plow or otherwise place snow, ice or other debris within seven (7) feet of a fire hydrant to conceal or limit access to such hydrant.

(b) No person shall transport, snow plow or otherwise place snow, ice or other debris upon the paved portion of any roadway.

## Snow Parking Ban



Orange Village would like to remind residents that there is a Village wide parking ban during snowstorms that exceed 2 inches. Code Section 351.03 states that no person shall stand or park a vehicle, except when necessary to avoid conflict with other traffic or to comply with the provisions of this Traffic Code, or while obeying the directions of a police officer or traffic control device. This allows for the Village crews to plow the streets safely and to maintain access for all emergency vehicles.

## Where are my 911 calls going?

***Do you have a VoIP (voice over internet protocol) phone for your home or business?  
If so, it may not connect you to the proper 911 dispatch center for your jurisdiction.***

Voice over Internet Protocol (VoIP) services mean you don't have a wire that runs from your telephone to a pole. It is all connected over the internet from virtually any connection anywhere. This raises challenges for the emergency services community in determining the location from which a 911 call has originated.

Provide your accurate physical address to your interconnected VoIP service provider to ensure that emergency services can quickly be dispatched to your location. Ask them to verify that your phone rings at the Chagrin Valley Dispatch Center if you live or own a business in Orange Village, Ohio 44022, 44122 or 44128 zip codes.

-  Be familiar with your VoIP service provider's procedures for updating your address and promptly update address information in the event of a change.
-  Have a clear understanding of any limitations of your 911 service, if any.
-  Inform children, babysitters and visitors about your VoIP service and its 911 limitations, if any.
-  If your power is out or your Internet connection is down, be aware that your VoIP service may not work. Consider installing a backup power supply, maintaining a traditional phone line or having a wireless phone as backup.
-  If you have questions about whether the phone service you are receiving is an interconnected VoIP service, contact your service provider for further information.



If you would like your phone tested, please contact Kristine, Monday through Friday from 8:00 a.m. to 4:00 p.m. at the Orange Village Police Department at 440-498-4400 and she will schedule your test with a police officer. ***DO NO CALL 911 FOR TESTING PURPOSES ON YOUR OWN.***

## Your 911 App

Orange Village launched a new safety app for smart phone users called 'Your 911'. This service offers improvements when reporting an emergency situation via cell phones. Download the Your 911 app on your smartphone and enter your information. The app is designed to provide a more accurate location for emergencies compared to current 911 calls from your cell phone without using this app.



To make a 911 call from the App, open the app and click on Emergency if you are in an area that contracts with Your911 you will be routed directly to their dispatch center for immediate assistance.

## Orange Village OCE&R Government Council Commission Vacancy

We are looking for a volunteer to represent Orange Village on the OCE&R Commission.

***What is the Orange Community Education & Recreation (OCE&R) Commission?*** An advisory council providing support and feedback so that a varied range of recreational and educational activities may be provided to area residents.

***What is the Government Council Commission Representative?*** The governmental representative is appointed by the Mayor and acts as a community liaison by meeting with the Mayor to discuss the needs and desires of OCE&R for Orange Village and report to the commission at each meeting. They may present an annual report to council each April. The Commission meets monthly on the second Tuesday of each month at the Pepper Pike Learning Center. If you are not able to fill the vacancy, you are still encouraged to attend Commission Meetings.

***Important considerations for potential Commission members:*** The OCE&R commission is advisory and does not have the same powers and responsibilities that the duly elected board of education members enjoy. The commission reviews the yearly budget and offers questions and comments but does not dictate the budget limits.

### ***Hiring contractors can be a bit intimidating for homeowners so we are here to help!*** by: Heritage Home Program



As a resident of Orange Village you can take advantage of this program.

How do we find the best contractor? How do we know when to pay them for the work? What goes into a contract? Are they using the right methods/materials for my home?

These questions and more come up when homeowners are planning projects for their home. They want to be sure that their home will be taken care of by a contractor that knows what they are doing and will complete the project correctly and safely. To have the best experience with a contractor working on a home, homeowners should make sure to have clear contracts that include the payment schedule, a detailed list of materials, information about warranties, daily clean-up procedures, and post the necessary permits on-site. Homeowners should ask contractors about the insurance they carry, what projects like theirs the contractor has completed, and call the references. Both the homeowners and the contractors need to be transparent in what work is going to be done and the cost. If there is a change in the contract, a written change order is needed.

Through the Heritage Home Program we can assist homeowners in reviewing contractor bids and estimates, give recommendations on repair and guidance on materials, supplies, and resources. The Heritage Home Loan includes a third-party review of the quality of the project and assists homeowners in communications with their contractors. In the contracts drawn up through the Heritage Home Loan, we require contractors to create a daily checklist for tidying up, ensure the use of drop cloths on carpet and furniture when painting, and that the contractors fully clean the site after the project is completed.
