#### RECYCLE PLASTICS PROPERLY

DO NOT judge whether something is recyclable by looking at the resin number (number on bottom). This was the general guideline at one time, but things have changed. Instead, ask yourself, "Is this a bottle or a jug?" If it's not shaped like a bottle or a jug, it should **not** be placed in your recycle container.

A good trick to determine whether something is a bottle or a jug is to check if it has a neck. Objects that don't have a neck or an opening smaller than it's body are **NOT** recyclable. This includes yogurt containers, produce containers (clamshells for berries and lettuce), plastic egg cartons and plastic bags.

It is important to place only recyclable items in the recycling bin.

When in doubt...Throw it out (in the trash)!

Chief Kostura has been a member of the Orange Village Police Department since 1979 and has risen through the ranks of Sergeant, Detective, Lieutenant and became the Chief of Police in 2001.

The Chief graduated from Bedford High School and is currently a board member of the Bedford City Schools Foundation. Chief Kostura graduated from Case Western Reserve University Police Academy. He attended the FBI National Academy (1991).

Chief Kostura has been the President of the Valley Enforcement Group (twice) and board member of the Ohio Association of Chiefs of Police (2005-2008). He is also an EMT/Firefighter for Orange Village.

Currently, he is on the Board of the Cuyahoga County Local Emergency Planning Committee and the Cuyahoga County *Crimestoppers*. Chief Kostura continues to participate with the Valley Enforcement Group's Hostage Negotiation Team and the Unmanned Aerial Surveillance Team.

Chief Kostura attended the Democracy and Global Security Conference in Istanbul, Turkey (2005) and recently travelled to Israel (2019) for an information sharing summit on security and anti-Semitism through the Jewish Federation.

#### PROTECT YOURSELF AGAINST HOME BURGLARY

Burglary is largely a crime of opportunity that can be prevented by taking a few simple steps to "harden" the target, which is your home.



- If you have an alarm system, USE IT (even at night)
- Lock your doors and windows when home or away. (Don't forget rear sliding doors, take a strong dowel, steel bar or twoby-four and slide it into the back groove)
- Remove keys from the ignition of your vehicles (cars in the garage too)
- Use perimeter lighting (motion lights)
- Prepare for vacation. Stop mail and newspapers, contact the police department for a vacation watch. Alert neighbors you trust about your trip and ask that they keep an eye on your property during that time. Do not post your vacation plans on social media.
- Be observant!
- BE A GOOD NEIGHBOR AND CALL 911 EVERY TIME YOU SEE SUSPICIOUS ACTIVITY!

With a little effort, observation, and team work, we can reduce the instances of successful burglaries and increase our chances of apprehension at the same time.


#### **BICYCLE SAFETY**

#### "Petiquette"

To all dog owners, please know that there is legislation 505.01 Dogs or other animals running at large. No regarding removal of feces and running at large.



505.085 Removal of dog feces. No person being the owner or in charge or control of any dog, shall permit such dog to commit a nuisance on school grounds, Village grounds or other public property. or upon any private property other than the property of such owner or person

without the permission of the owner of such property. The owner or person in charge or control of such dog shall immediately remove all feces deposited by such dog and dispose of the same in a sanitary manner.

owner can allow a dog to run at large. All dogs must be on a leash when they are being walked.

Dog droppings can impact our groundwater, streams, and lake. When it rains, bacteria from dog waste can soak into groundwater, or be carried by rainwater to storm sewers which carry the flow to nearby streams. In both cases, the water is not treated at a wastewater treatment plant.

Let's be very conscious of the law as responsible dog owners in order to enjoy our pets and provide a safe and healthy environment for everyone in Orange Village.


#### SUMMER SAFETY CHECK

The members of the Orange Village Fire Department would like to reiterate some of our past safety tips so that each home within the Village can perform a "Summer Safety Check". Your safety is literally what defines our job. As we have stated in the past you can "Help Us To Help You" so that we are true partners when it comes to your safety and the safety of those that you love.

1. SMOKE DETECTORS - It is imperative that you have working smoke detectors on each level of the home, in the hallway adjacent to all bedrooms (one in common hallway upstairs and one outside of master bedroom on first floor as an example) and in large open areas away from the bedrooms. FUN FACT: All home sales require a point-of-sale inspection and that process includes the Fire Department. We will check the home to make sure it conforms to these requirements. - 2. CARBON MONOXIDE DETECTOR Every home should have a working carbon monoxide detector in the basement, at entry area from the garage and in any sleeping area. A good idea is to purchase a combination smoke and c.o. unit for bedroom areas. This combination unit will save money and satisfy both requirements listed above.
- 3. ESCAPE PLAN Have an "Escape Plan" complete with a family meeting place. During a fire, family members should know 2 ways out. If only one way and it is blocked by smoke and heat (feel door) then family members should stay by a window and wave a pillow or bright object. Once on the scene our first action is to walk 360 degrees around your home and check all windows for those unable to escape. You then become our immediate priority if we see you in the window.
- 4. DOWNED WIRES KILL Heavy wind brings down trees which are often comingled with electrical wires. All wires should be considered live even if you are positive the wire is dead. Go over this concern with your children every year.
- 5. RECREATIONAL TRAIL SAFETY Our recreational trails are an incredible addition to this wonderful Village. A reminder to teach your children to be careful and make them aware of potential interactions with cars backing out or pulling into driveways. The Village has taken measures to ensure "blind spots" are reduced. As trees and bushes grow please report any issues you encounter that reduces the ability to safely pass by one's driveway.



#### **Building Department News**

Spring & summer are always welcomed in Northeast Ohio after a long winter. During those times many think about the projects that they want to accomplish as the weather improves. Among those are possibly a new deck for entertaining, a shed for storing extra items, a change of landscape and grading of the yard or more.

The building department would like to remind everyone that permits may be required for your project. If in doubt, please contact the building department at 440-498-4405 for more information. Permits for construction and inspections of work ensure that homes and businesses are safe, preserved and maintained in good repair. This process helps our community remain a safe and attractive place to live.





#### **Ownership Guidelines for Your Home's Electrical System**

Information provided by The Illuminating Company



When your home's exterior electrical system is damaged, it's important to understand which components are the Illuminating Company's responsibility and which are yours.

If you receive overhead electric service, they are responsible for the following components:

- 1. **Service Drop** The wires running from the utility pole to your home.
- **2.** *Electric Meter* Measures your electricity use in kilowatt-hours.

You own and are responsible for repairing the following:



- 4. Service Entrance Cable The wire that extends from your weatherhead to the meter and from the meter to your fuse box or circuit breaker box.
- 5. Meter Base Your meter is mounted in this box.
- **6.** Fuse Box or Circuit Breaker Box This is the main service panel that houses your fuses or circuit breakers.
- 7. **Household Wiring** The interior wiring that distributes electricity through your home.

As a customer, it's also your responsibility to maintain open access to the meter and keep obstructions away from power lines that extend from the utility pole to your home. If trees on your property grow near power lines, don't prune or remove them yourself. Consult with a tree contractor who is qualified to work around electric equipment.

## **Branch Chipping 2021**

- ▲ DO NOT mix leaves, grass clipping or yard material
- ▲ Limbs should be placed with cut ends facing the road, no more than 2 feet high and 3 feet wide

This service is not intended to chip complete trees or for use by a commercial tree service provider.

### **Metal Recycling Opportunity**

A drop-off dumpster is available for ferrous and non-ferrous recyclables. It is located at the Service Department, 4680 Lander Road by the salt shed and is marked with a sign under the overhang. It is for "Metals only" - no other trash or products.

#### **CONTAINER RENTAL SERVICE OFFERED**

Are you planning Spring projects? For a fee, Orange Village will drop off a 6, 8, 10 or 12 yard container during the months of April through November (weather permitting) to help dispose of brush, yard waste, construction debris or household debris. You cannot mix items in the container but you can choose from several different types of materials to dispose. Costs vary depending on the items that will be disposed. #### Safe digging starts with you!

Planning to dig? Here's what you need to know...Calling before you dig is important not only for safety reasons but also because IT'S THE LAW! By law, homeowners should contact OHIO811, 8-1-1 or 1-800-362-2764, at least 48 hours but no more than 10 working days (excluding weekends and legal holidays) or submit your request online at http://www.oups.org/edig. We recently experienced a power outage in areas throughout the Village that was caused by a contractor hitting an electrical line. They did NOT call before they dug.

**ORC Sec. 3781.28.** (A) Except as otherwise provided in divisions (C), (D), (E), and (F) of this section, at least forty-eight hours but not more than ten working days before commencing excavation, the excavator shall notify a protection service of the location of the excavation site and the date on which excavation is planned to commence.
