Council Spotlight Brandon Duber

Council President Brandon Duber was first elected to Village Council in November, 2011 and re-elected in 2015 and 2019. He began serving as Council President in 2015 and is currently in his 8th year as the leader of Village Council. Prior to serving as Council President, Brandon had chaired the Safety Committee and Parks and Recreation Committee, and served as President Pro-Tem.

During his time on council, Council President Duber was instrumental in the installation of our all-purpose trails throughout the Village. Mr. Duber was influential in the complete overhaul of the community playground and bathroom addition. His legal background helped in creating the framework for the Pinecrest development. Council President Duber has also been heavily involved in all other proposed development throughout the Village making sure our Village does not lose its character. He has also worked hard to make sure our safety forces and service department have the necessary resources to provide the best community support possible for our residents.

A lifelong resident of Orange Village, Brandon was born and raised in the Village, graduated from Orange High School, received his Bachelor of Arts from Skidmore College, and his Juris Doctor from the Case Western Reserve University School of Law.

Council President Duber is the managing partner of the law firm Bentoff & Duber Co., L.P.A., where he concentrates his practice on representing the injured and disabled in the areas of workers' compensation, personal injury, and social security disability.

Brandon and his wife Amber have two beautiful children, a 3-year-old girl and a six-month old boy. In his free time, Brandon enjoys spending time with his family, golfing, skiing and travelling.

RATING THE SUBURBS RESULTS:

Cleveland Magazine's 2022 Best Places to Live has ranked Orange Village as the number 5 BEST suburb in Northeast Ohio. In fact, five of the top six communities are our neighbors located in the Chagrin Valley! We already know how wonderful living in Orange Village is and I'm glad Cleveland Magazine agrees.

SAFETY IN ORANGE VILLAGE:

The Orange Village Police Department has experienced a sharp increase in crimes since the onset of the pandemic. Prior to January, 2020, the Orange Village Police Department had never had an officer injured in the line of duty due to a violent crime nor an officer-involved shooting. Since that date, we have experienced both, leaving three officers lucky to be alive after literal fights for their life. Since January, 2020 we have charged more individuals with crimes of violence or crimes related to firearms, including attempted aggravated murder of a police officer, than any other time period in the department's history.

It is vitally important to note that this increase in violence is occurring in our Orange Place Business district which is made up of retail, hotels and dining. (This does not include Pinecrest.) Our Orange Village Police Department has done an excellent job keeping crime out of our neighborhoods and has, so far, contained these problems to just the one area.

In response to this significant increase in crime, we are implementing a plan to immediately increase the staffing in our police department. Fairly soon we will be welcoming two new full-time officers and at least 3 part-time officers. Our Police Department works extremely hard on our behalf. Please be sure to welcome our new officers to the community, when you see them.

There is nothing more important than the safety of our residents and visitors. We are fully committed to providing our Orange Village Police Department with the resources necessary to carry out their mission.

I always welcome your comments and feedback and look forward to being able to see everyone in person soon.

FIREWORKS PROHIBITED IN ORANGE VILLAGE

Residents may have been made aware that the Ohio General Assembly recently amended a section of the Ohio Revised Code to permit “..the discharge, ignition and explosion” of fireworks on certain holidays and the weekends that surround them. In short, the state now permits the use of consumer grade fireworks during pre-defined dates throughout the year. Included in this legislation was an “opt out” clause which allows for a municipality to determine whether or not they wish to continue the prohibition on the use of these fireworks within their communities.



Orange Village Ordinance 2022-7 was enacted by Village Council and by the Mayor's signature on May 4th of this year, after consideration and the advice of our Police and Fire Departments, to continue the prohibition related to these pyrotechnics. Your elected representatives unanimously agreed that opting out of this statewide legislation was necessary for the continuance of peace and safety throughout our community.

Effective July 1, 2022, Orange Village will “opt out” of this new permissive use and continue the longstanding practice of prohibiting the use of fireworks within the Village unless they are discharged by a professional licensed exhibitor.

Neighboring communities such as the Village of Moreland Hills and Chagrin Falls have also opted out and continued their prohibition on the use of fireworks.

As in the past, this prohibition does not apply to “novelties and trick noisemakers” nor does the prohibition apply to the use of “wire sparklers”. If residents have any questions they may contact Village Administration or the Police and Fire Chief.

CANS FOR BURNED CHILDREN

Orange Village Fire Department collects aluminum beverage cans for recycling. All profits benefit the Aluminum Cans for Burned Children Foundation.



In 1986 the Northern Ohio Fire Fighters, the Northeast Fire Chiefs' Association, along with Metro Health Medical Center of Cleveland began the Aluminum Cans for Burned Children Foundation (ACBC) to help children who suffer severe burn injuries.

If you would like to separate these cans from your other recyclables, please deposit them in the recycle bins located on the south entrance to Village Hall by the Fire Station, 4600 Lander Road.

Seat Belts Save Lives!

Wearing a seat belt is one of the safest choices drivers and passengers can make. In Orange Village, not wearing a seat belt is a PRIMARY traffic offense for the driver and front seat passenger.

According to the National Highway Traffic Safety Association, buckling up properly is the single most effective thing you can do to protect yourself in a crash. Being buckled during a crash helps keep you secure inside the vehicle, rather than being ejected, which is almost always deadly. Remember, seat belts work together with air bags. They prevent you from being thrown into a rapidly opening frontal air bag and keep you in place when a car crumples during a crash.

It is our goal, that all persons traveling on roadways within the Orange Village will do so safely by exercising sound judgement and choosing to buckle up.



LANDSCAPING/STRUCTURES IN RIGHT OF WAY/EASEMENTS

Orange Village residents have often asked whether they can place landscaping or structures near Village roads. Some people plant beautiful flowers, or have bushes or trees, next to the road or around utility boxes. While these actions make properties look nice and beautify the Village, it is important to remember that anything planted or installed in the right of way or utility easement is at risk, including sprinkler systems.

It is very common for utility companies to work in the right of way or utility easement, and they have the legal right to damage or remove anything that is in their way. The Village has no authority to require that they repair or replace the items. If a resident would like to place a permanent structure, other than a mailbox, in the right of way or utility easement, e.g., a fence or entry feature, the Village's Council needs to approve such an action – and it will only do so if the property owner takes all responsibility for the structure, including the removal of the structure if the Village or a public utility needs to access the area where the structure is located. Ideally, the areas in the right of way or utility easement should be kept free of conditions (vegetation and structures) that could interfere with the purpose of the roads.

The Village's roads are legally dedicated to the traveling public, and any plants or structures that are placed near the roads are at risk from that public – or subject to being impacted by road maintenance activities (e.g., snow plowing and repaving). Village employees work very hard not to damage plants and structures that are adjacent to the roadway, but if such damage occurs the Village is not legally liable for replacing those plants or structures. All items that are planted or installed in the right of way or utility easement are the responsibility of the person placing it there, not the Village.

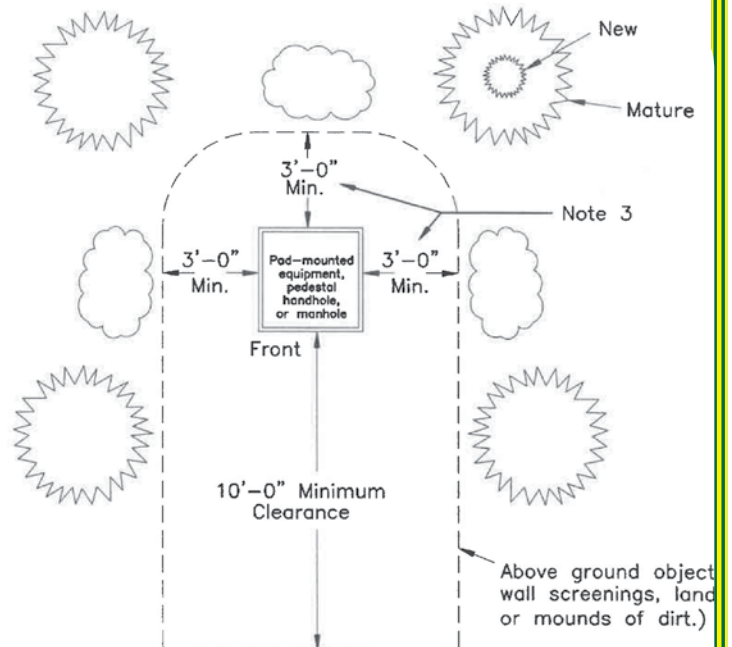





Diagram from FirstEnergy concerning the clearance need for access to underground electric cables.

Recycling Opportunities

Branch Chipping

The Orange Village Service Department will be collecting branches and brush on **July 18 and September 12.**

-  DO NOT mix leaves, grass clippings or yard material
-  Limbs should be placed with cut ends toward the road, no more than 2 feet high and 3 feet wide
-  DO NOT make large piles

This service is not intended to chip complete trees or for use by a commercial tree service provider.

Wood Chips

Orange Village delivers wood chips free of charge to residents. An approximate load size is 10 yards. Requests are honored in the order they are received, while supplies last. Place your order online at www.OrangeVillage.com under the forms tab, or call Village Hall at 440-498-4400.

Scrap Tire Collection - Sept. 1 to 15

The Service Department will collect tires that are removed from the rim. You may drop off your tires Monday through Friday from 7:00 a.m. to 3:00 p.m. at 4680 Lander Road.

August 1 through 31 Monday - Friday and First Friday of Every Month

Household Hazardous Waste

First Friday of Every Month

Orange Village will accept unwanted oil-based paint, pesticides and other household hazardous waste.

Collections are located at Orange Village Service Department, 4680 Lander Road between 7 a.m. and 3 p.m.

Recycle American Flags

Orange Village Service Department offers a flag drop off box at the recycle center. You may drop your flags off during our HHW/Computer Collection day, the first Friday of every month from 7:00 a.m. to 3:00 p.m. Please place the flags in the specially marked container.



Recycle Metal



A drop-off dumpster is available for ferrous and non-ferrous recyclables. It is located at the Service Department, 4680 Lander Road by the salt shed and is marked with a sign under the overhang. It is for "Metals only" - no other trash or products.

Not only does the program allow for us to reduce landfill costs, it also earns money for scrap.

CONTAINER RENTAL SERVICE

Orange Village will drop off a 6, 8, 10 or 12 yard container through November (weather permitting) to help dispose of brush, yard waste, construction debris or household debris. You cannot mix items in the container but you can choose from several different types of materials to dispose. Costs vary depending on the items that will be disposed of. Miscellaneous Items for CURBSIDE TRASH Pickup

The following items may be placed at the curb on pickup day.

If the items are large, as a courtesy, please contact Kimble directly at 1-800-201-0005 to notify them of an "oversized" pick-up.



Household Appliances, such as washers, dryers, etc. will be picked up on your regular collection day. Doors must be removed from refrigerators/freezers.

Furniture and Mattresses (must be covered in plastic and taped closed) should be placed on the curb on your regular collection day.

Carpeting & Padding will be taken on your regular collection day if it is neatly rolled or folded and tied in pieces no longer than 4 feet and weighing no more than 50 pounds and placed at the curb.



HOW TO DISPOSE OF LATEX PAINT

Orange Village does **not** accept latex paint in the Household Hazardous Waste Disposal Program because it is not a hazardous material. Latex paint (a.k.a. water-based, acrylic, or emulsion paint) is comprised mostly of water and can be safely disposed of in your household trash as long as it is solidified first. Listed below are ways to solidify latex paint:

- **Air dry.** Remove the lid and allow the liquid to evaporate. This works well for small quantities of paint (an inch or two in the bottom of the can), and can take several days.



- **Use a drying agent.** Mix an equal amount of an absorbent material into the can and allow the paint to dry. Use cat litter, sawdust, plaster of Paris, Oil-dri, or "waste paint hardeners" found at home improvement centers. The paint could dry quickly, depending on how much drying agent you include in the can.

- **Pour thin layers** (about 1" of paint) into a cardboard box lined with plastic. Allow the paint to dry one layer at a time until all paint has hardened.

Once the paint is thoroughly dry, place it next to your trash container for Monday trash collection.

CONSTRUCTION UPDATE

ODOT - I-271 Resurfacing

The Ohio Department of Transportation (ODOT) informed Orange Village that they will begin resurfacing the I-271 corridor from Warrensville Heights north to Mayfield Heights. This work will be performed at night due to less traffic on the roadways.



Construction is expected to be completed in October 2022, weather dependent. You should not experience any major delays due to this construction, but please drive safely through the area.

Orange Hill Subdivision Resurfacing

Work is anticipated to start at the end of July and will last approximately 2 months. Resident access will be maintained.
