
# OPEN BURNING AND RECREATIONAL FIRES

As we move into spring and summer, Orange Village Fire Department would like to remind you of what is and is not permitted regarding open burning and recreational fires.

The State of Ohio prohibits open burning in villages and cities, including the burning of yard waste or other residential trash. Having a hot dog on a stick nearby does not make your open burning a cooking fire!

Recreational fires are permitted under the following conditions:

- Fires in approved containers must be at least 25 feet from a structure
- Use only seasoned wood to minimize excessive smoke conditions
- Fire pit or area shall have a maximum diameter of 3 feet with a height of 2 feet or less
- Any fire shall be constantly attended until the fire is extinguished
- A method to extinguish the fire shall be readily available (i.e. hose, fire extinguisher, sand, dirt)



# **ALUMINUM CANS FOR BURNED CHILDREN**

In 1986 the Northern Ohio Fire Fighters, the Northeast Fire Chief's Association, along with Metro Health Medical Center of Cleveland began the Aluminum Cans for Burned Children Foundation (ACBC) to help children who suffer severe burn injuries.

If you would like to separate these cans from your other recyclables, please deposit them in the recycle bins located on the south entrance to Village Hall by the Fire Station, 4600 Lander Road.

# RECREATION CAPITAL IMPROVEMENT FUND

Orange Village is constantly improving our wonderful park system.

### Did you ever wonder how this is all possible?

In 1991, council passed an ordinance which provides for the imposition of a \$750 fee on new home/apartment construction. This fee can be used for Village recreational capital improvements only and is deposited in the Village Recreational Capital Improvement Fund.

This fee has enabled us to provide residents with a 53+ acre park including nature preserves with a half mile of paved trails, two baseball fields with bleachers and back stops, soccer field, sledding hill, two picnic pavilions with tables and grills, putting and chipping greens, community garden, dog park, basketball court, two pickleball courts, outdoor restroom facility and a state of the art playground. We plan to add a new larger pavilion with a fire pit as well as a bocce ball court and cornhole.

# Orange Village Powers a Clean Future

Orange Village continues to build a clean energy future for our employees and residents. There are many ways our community continues to reduce energy costs including:

- Recycling of computer/escrap, flags, tires, scrap metal, aluminum cans, paper shredding, holiday lights and holiday trees
- Installation of LED lighting in all buildings, grounds, streetlights and traffic signals
- Applied and awarded a grant from the Great Lakes Restoration Initiative to increase our tree canopy
- First community in Cuyahoga County to enact a plastic bag ordinance
- Anti-idling policy
- Pursuing greenspace and wetlands protection with the development of the property on Harvard Road
- Orange Village Master plan addresses greenspace and a rural type environment while addressing future development and economic stability
- Upgraded our HVAC system and lighting equipment for energy efficiency with grant funding through **NOPEC**
- Installation of over 8 miles of recreational trails throughout the Village encouraging walking and biking to reduce our carbon output
- Orange Goes Green Certification Program

> Dog droppings can impact our groundwater, streams, and lake. When it rains, bacteria from dog waste can soak into groundwater, or be carried by rainwater to storm sewers which carry the flow to nearby streams. In both cases, the water is not treated at a wastewater treatment plant.

Let's be very conscious of the law as responsible dog owners to enjoy our pets and provide a safe and healthy environment for everyone in Orange Village.

# Mulch Volcanoes

As beneficial as mulch is, too much can be harmful. The generally recommended mulching depth is 2 to 4 inches. Unfortunately, many landscapes are falling victim to a plague of overmulching. "Mulch volcanoes" are excessive piles of mulch materials applied around the base of trees.

While organic mulches must be replenished over time, buildup can occur if reapplication outpaces decomposition or if new material is added simply to refresh color. Deep mulch can be effective in suppressing weeds and reducing maintenance, but it often causes additional problems.



# **Problems Associated with Improper Mulching:**

- On wet soils, deep mulch can lead to excess moisture in the root zone, which can stress the plant and cause root rot.
- Piling mulch against the trunk or stems of plants can stress stem tissues and may lead to the development of insect and disease problems or stem girdling roots.
- Thick blankets of fine mulch can become matted and may reduce the penetration of water and air.
- Some mulches, especially those containing fresh grass clippings, can affect soil pH and may eventually lead to nutrient deficiencies or toxic buildups.
- Mulch piled high against the trunks of young trees may create habitats for rodents that chew the bark and can girdle the trees.
- Anaerobic "sour" mulch may give off pungent odors, and the alcohols and organic acids that build up may be toxic to young plants.

# **Scam Warnings**

Orange Village Police Department warns residents to be careful because there are a number of people that are scamming others. Below is a listing of some of the types of scams you may encounter.



- Arrest/Court Scams (Scammers pose as law enforcement or court officials)
- IRS Scams (Callers pose as IRS agents)
- Computer Tech Scam (Callers pretend to be techs offering help with one's computer)
- Sweepstakes/Lottery Scams
- Social Security or Medicare Scams

- Grandparent Scams (Callers pretend to be grandkids in trouble with the law)
- Robocalls (Tie with grandparent scams)
- Credit or Account Scams (Callers pose as banks or offer to lower credit rates)
- Charity Scam Calls
- Debt Collection Scams (Tie with charity calls)

Please call the Orange Village Police Department at 440-247-7321 if you suspect someone is trying to get you to part with your money, information or you are just not sure what to do. It is most likely a scam even if it has the appearance of being official business. We are here to assist you in any way possible.


