"In My Own Words"

Where in Orange Village do you live and how long have you lived there?

I live in a little, but very friendly development, called Orangewood since 2017.

Where did you live prior to Orange Village?

I relocated from Israel through Philips Medical and lived in Mayfield since 2014.

What is your 'Orange Story'?

I believe, until 2022, I was focusing on one job and a very routine but happy life. After the Russian invasion, together with a few other good people, we created "URGENT" (urgentuniversal.com). Something that started with a very emotional reaction became my second job and a very dedicated mission. Today, we are driving three programs. Besides the medical and charity work, we developed an educational/cultural development program we launched with Brady Middle School. This is my Orange story—the community, the people.

What is the unique slice you bring to Orange?

I can't point to any unique slice, to be honest. However, through the Open Dialogue™ program, we are building a unique platform for a brighter future for our children, no matter where they live or come from, in an environment where they can have fun and develop their interpersonal skills.

What is the impact of this on others?

I am proud to represent URGENT, a nonprofit that has saved over 1,000,000 lives across 14 Ukrainian hospitals with more than 55,000 lbs of medical aid since April 2022. The Open Dialogue™ program will help these kids in the long term to develop communication skills for better agreements and maybe even international contracts using their multicultural skills.

Why is it important that people know about this?

The Open Dialogue™ program is unique. Many believe knowing English means knowing American English, which I disagree with based on my personal experience since relocating here. This program improves communication skills and aims to develop a student exchange program. In our medical program, we distribute aid quickly to those in need, especially small cities. I have traveled to Ukraine three times to ensure we follow American standards and verify our aid delivery on the front lines. I feel blessed by our dedicated team operating in a war zone.

From the Office of Mayor

Orange Village continues to pursue opportunities for improvement. In that regard, I want to provide an update on the state of the Village. As we continue to build upon the successes of the past administration, we have begun to pursue other potential programs and deal with issues that contribute to our quality of life. With this in mind, I would note the following activities and actions undertaken:


- Following a request for proposals to engage an outside facilitator to develop a community-wide survey, we have engaged the Cuyahoga County Planning Commission, as our consultant, to move forward on the development of the community-wide survey. We have met with them to produce the document and initiate the survey.
- After having met with the City of Beachwood to re-establish our boundary on the northwest area of Orange Place which is a discussion that has been pursued for more than 20 years, we have provided documentation for this action to move forward. Beachwood has passed legislation to adopt the boundary change. It will now come back to Orange for an amendment to our original approved legislation. It will then go on to Cuyahoga County Council for ratification. In the meantime, we will be working on a Memorandum of Understanding with regard to responsibilities and obligations for the mutual management of Orange Place.
- We are completing negotiation of the development agreement and approvals of preliminary development plans for the Living Well Collection project, which was approved by voters on March 19.
- The eclipse glasses purchased by the Village to enable residents to observe the phenomenon safely on April 8 did not work as planned. As a result, we received a refund. We are applying the funds to a concert at the Village Amphitheater scheduled June 25, 2024. I hope residents will come and enjoy the event.
- Completed work on a replacement of the flagpole plaza in front of Village Hall produced by our Service Department in partnership with Tri-C's Landscape program.
- Continuing to work with both the Chagrin Valley Watershed Partners and the Western Reserve Land Conservancy to produce the future park area that will come through the passage of Issue 14.
- Last, but not least, we have purchased a property on Emery Road from the County Landbank to add to the Village Park. I was able to negotiate an extremely small price for this land. In working with the Cuyahoga County Landbank, we are also going to set up an Orange Village Landbank that will enable the Village to obtain future properties directly with no cost to Orange Village to expand green space and accommodate other community needs. We will be working with the Cuyahoga County Landbank to put this program in place.

On a sad note, as many of you may be aware, on the weekend of May 11, Jacob Derbin, a City of Euclid Police Officer, was killed in the line of duty. Jacob was the nephew and godson of Orange Village Officer Dustin Derbin. Orange Village extends its profound sympathies to the Derbin family in the loss of a beloved family member. With the passing of Jacob Derbin and other fallen officers, all of our communities are diminished. In the face of such a tragedy, I pause to honor such brave men and women who are willing to put themselves in harms way to serve and protect our communities each and every day. Whenever you encounter our police and firefighters, thank them for their service and their commitment to our Village.

On May 22, the Chagrin Valley Police Departments were recognized for their service to the communities they serve at a "First Responders Event". At this year's event, Sgt. Mike Debeljak was recognized for his bravery in the face of a life-threatening event resulting from the apprehension of an individual. He represents all that is the best in our Orange Village employees.

There is more to come with our eyes to the future. I hope to bring all along to participate in some way to make Orange Village better together.

HEAT EMERGENCIES



Heat emergencies can occur at any time of year, but summertime naturally increases the risks of heat related illness. It is important to know the three stages of heat emergencies: heat cramps, heat exhaustion and heat stroke. The underlying cause of any heat emergency is the increase in core body temperature. Children and older adults are more at risk for heat emergencies. Other risk factors include being overweight or consuming alcohol. All these can affect the body's ability to regulate temperature.

Everyone can take preventative measures before heading into the heat: rest often in a cool area, drink plenty of water before activity, wear loose and light colored clothing and avoid alcohol.

ALUMINUM CANS FOR BURNED CHILDREN

In 1986 the Northern Ohio Fire Fighters, the Northeast Fire Chief's Association, along with Metro Health Medical Center of Cleveland began the Aluminum Cans for Burned Children Foundation (ACBC) to help children who suffer severe burn injuries.

RECREATION CAPITAL IMPROVEMENT FUND

Orange Village is constantly improving our wonderful park system.

Did you ever wonder how this is all possible?

In 1991, council passed an ordinance which provides for the imposition of a \$750 fee on new home/apartment construction. This fee can be used for Village recreational capital improvements only and is deposited in the Village Recreational Capital Improvement Fund.

This fee has enabled us to provide residents with a 53+ acre park including nature preserves with a half mile of paved trails, two baseball fields with bleachers and back stops, soccer field, sledding hill, three picnic pavilions with tables, grills and a fire pit, community garden, dog park, basketball court, two pickleball courts, outdoor restroom facility and a state of the art playground.



SOLAR PANELS

With spring here and summer on the way, many residents may be eager to capture some of the abundant sunshine and convert it to energy to power their homes or electric vehicles by way of installing solar panels on the roofs of their dwellings. While solar panels are a great way to reduce carbon emissions and help the environment, there are numerous regulations governing the installation of such devices. This is a friendly reminder from the Building Department that permits and inspections are required to install solar panels. If you have a Homeowners Association, please consult with them as well. The purpose of these requirements is to ensure a safe and code compliant installation so the equipment can operate properly for years to come. If you have questions regarding solar panel installation, permits required or need a list of registered electrical contractors, please contact the Building Department at 440-498-4405.



THINKING OF REMODELING



The Heritage Home Program may be able to help! Orange Village continues its partnership with the Heritage Home Program in order to offer this assistance to our residents. If your home is at least 50 years old you can take advantage of the services from the Heritage Home Program FREE.

These include site visits from construction specialists, review of contractor bids and estimates, color consults for exterior painting, low interest loans, recommendations on maintenance, repairs, and much more.

It is also very important to sign up for our CodeRed emergency notifications. These notifications are sent via phone, email and/or text. They include emergency notifications which may include road closures, water main breaks, fire or floods or chemical spills. You also have the capability to sign up for non-emergency notifications.

PROTECT YOURSELF AGAINST BURGLARY

Burglary is largely a crime of opportunity that can be prevented by taking a few simple steps to protect your home and/or vehicle:

- ♥ If you have an alarm system, USE IT (even at night)
- ♥ Remove keys from your vehicles (cars in the garage too)
- ♥ Use perimeter lighting (motion lights)
- ♥ Lock your doors and windows when home or away. (Don't forget rear sliding doors. Use a strong dowel, steel bar or two-by-four and place it into the back groove)
- ♥ Prepare for vacation. Stop mail and newspapers and contact the police department for a vacation watch. Alert neighbors you trust about your trip and ask that they keep an eye on your property during that time. Do not post your vacation plans on social media.
- ♥ Be observant!

Loss of Power: If you experience a power outage or intermittent power loss, please contact The Illuminating Company, a FirstEnergy Company. You can report the issue by phone at 888-544-4877 or via their website at www.firstenergycorp.com. If there is a downed electrical wire, please stay away from the wires and call 911.

Water Issues: If you experience low water pressure, discolored water or no water, contact the Cleveland Water Department at 216-664-3060. If you see water coming from an area in the road, please contact Cleveland Water AND Orange Village Police Department at 440-498-4401 or the non-emergency after hours phone number at 440-247-7321.



Safe digging starts with you!

Planning to dig? Here's what you need to know...Calling before you dig is important not only for safety reasons but also because IT'S THE LAW! By law, homeowners should contact OHIO811, 8-1-1 or 1-800-362-2764, at least 48 hours but no more than 10 working days (excluding weekends and legal holidays) or submit your request online at <http://www.oups.org/edig>.

ORC Sec. 3781.28. (A) Except as otherwise provided in divisions (C), (D), (E), and (F) of this section, at least forty-eight hours but not more than ten working days before commencing excavation, the excavator shall notify a protection service of the location of the excavation site and the date on which excavation is planned to commence.

- DO NOT mix leaves, grass clippings or yard material
- Limbs should be placed with cut ends facing the road, no more than 2 feet high and 3 feet wide

This service is not intended to chip complete trees or for use by a commercial tree service provider.

A drop-off dumpster is available for ferrous and non-ferrous recyclables. It is located at the Service Department, 4680 Lander Road by the salt shed and is marked with a sign under the overhang. It is for "Metals only" - no other trash or products.

CONTAINER RENTAL SERVICE OFFERED

Are you planning Spring projects? For a fee, Orange Village will drop off a 6, 8, 10 or 12 yard container during the months of April through November (weather permitting) to help dispose of brush, yard waste, construction debris or household debris. You cannot mix items in the container but you can choose from several different types of materials to dispose. Costs vary depending on the items that will be disposed. To all dog owners, please know there is legislation regarding removal of feces and running at large.

505.01 Dogs or other animals running at large.

505.085 Removal of dog feces.

Dog droppings can impact our groundwater, streams, and lake. When it rains, bacteria from dog waste can soak into groundwater, or be carried by rainwater to storm sewers which carry the flow to nearby streams. In both cases, the water is not treated at a wastewater treatment plant.

Let's be very conscious of the law as responsible dog owners to enjoy our pets and provide a safe and healthy environment for everyone in Orange Village.
